Francisco Di Paola Satolli, Bishop of Frascati and Prefect of the congregation of studies, died at four o'clock this morning. Death followed an illness that began with an attack of nephritis and atrophy of the right lung last June and was complicated recently with blood poisoning. He was an Italian, born at Marsciano, July 21st, 1839. The Pope was greatly grieved when the Cardinal's death' was announced. He recalled that it was the convincing argument of Satolli which influenced him to accept the papacy of the last conclave.


