Here and There.

DUNDEE SAILING.—The S. S. Dundee, Capt. Darius Blandford, will leave St. John's at 10 to-night to take up the Bonavista Bay service for the summer.

STAR SPORTS MEET.—The Star-Cadet sports met last night and outlined a programme for the summer. They elected their officers for the coming year.

BANKER GETS 600 QTLS.—The banker Grace Tibbo arrived from the western fishery at Grand Bank Thursday with 600 qtls. of fish. She did good work and fished off Rose Blanche since the middle of February.

DORIES ARE SCARCE.—Owing to the fact that many of the fishermen going to Labrador this summer will try to make the voyage, many dories have been bought up by them and they are now scarce in the market. These boats will fetch a good price henceforth.

VESSELS FISHING.—All the vessels which were damaged at Grand Bank with the ice which came down the river there a few weeks ago have been repaired and are now on the Banks fishing.

PICKING UP WRECKAGE.—The fishermen of Petty Harbor are out to-day picking up the wreckage of their stages and flakes scattered about the harbor. John Lee had a flake 70 feet by 100 feet carried away. His stage and wharf were also swept.

BIG MOLASSES IMPORTATION.—During the past three weeks eight sail of vessels have arrived from Barbadoes with molasses cargoes to different consignees. These brought several thousand puncheons of this commodity, so necessary to our fishermen, and with such a large supply no doubt the article will be sold at reasonable figures.

IS LEAKING BADLY—TUG SENT TO HER.

Word was received in the city this morning to the effect that the schr. Atlanta, owned by Earle of Fogo, struck an iceberg early this morning in Baccalieu Tickle during a fog and was leaking pretty badly. The vessel left here last evening laden with general cargo for Messrs. Earle and it is presumed struck the iceberg in a fog. Capt. Mark James sent a boat to Bay de Verde to wire for assistance and the tug John Green was immediately despatched by Capt. Strong. The vessel will likely be towed back here for repairs.
