

## **Montreal Man** great convenience—60c, and upwards Shot In His Home

Posse of Armed Men Are Searching for Giant Negro.

Montreal, Sept. 23 .- Louis Betournay, fifty-two years old, is dying in the Royal Victoria Hospital, while an armed posse of fifty men strong and its numbers constantly augmented is tracking down a giant negro who shot Betournay early this morning in his home at St. Lamberts. Betournay had come down stairs from his bed room to light the fires. He found the negro crouched under a table in the corner of the kitchen. Kicking him he or-dered the man out of the house. The intruder sullenly emerged and Betournay started to leave the room. The negro stealthily followed him

along the hall and suddenly whipping out a revolver fired three shots in rapid succession. The first crashed through Betournay's back, and the other two went wild. The negro leaped past his victim, darted out the front door and down the street, but despite his wound Betournay chased him. For nearly a quarter of a mile he kept up the pursuit, but as loss of blood made him weaker, he was forced to give up the chase, and stagering back to his room collapsed.
The negro had been seen around St. Lamberts for several days, and his gave a clue to the police, and a posse was organized. The negro had dis-appeared into the woods back of St. amberts and at noon had not been ocated, although it is inevitable that ne will before nightfall be rounded up He is expected to put up a desperate
