## At the City Hall.

The Chairman and full Board were  
present at last night's meeting of the  
Civic Commission.  
D. Whitten, South Side, asked that  
the road near his property be attend-  
ed to. The matter was referred to the  
Engineer.

The Solicitor reported on the ap-  
plication of the Commercial Cable Co.  
re taxation on their business. If offi-  
ces were established in the city. In  
the Solicitor's opinion the Board had  
no option than to impose a tax, the  
maximum being \$500 per annum. A  
considerable discussion followed, the  
principal trend of opinion being that  
when the Act was passed, no such  
case was in view. The Legislature  
will be asked to amend the Act at the  
next session giving the Council a  
right of option in such cases.  
The Engineer's report showed an  
abnormal waste of water throughout  
the city, particularly in frosty weath-  
er.

The Sanitary Supervisor submitted  
his annual report which dealt at  
length with general sanitation, cobble  
stone drains, disposal of night soil,  
public lavatories and the dog nui-  
sance. With regard to the dog ques-  
tion the Supervisor suggested that the  
owners be compelled by law to keep  
the animals in kennels at night. The  
matter will be taken up at an early  
date, and with it the question whether  
the dog tax should belong to the city,  
and not to the general revenue.

Inspector Rooney tabled a list of  
houses in various streets, which were  
not connected with the sewers. The  
Engineer will prepare plans, prepara-  
tory to the question being taken up  
by the Sanitary Committee.

Before the close of the meeting Mr.  
Mullaly called the attention of the  
Board to what he considered a dis-  
courtesy on their part, in the passing  
of a vote (to which he had objected),  
during his unavoidable absence. He  
also wished to state that he had not  
been treated with courtesy by the of-  
ficials. He had asked for certain in-  
formation some three weeks ago, and  
was told that the clerks were too  
busy to furnish it.

Mr. McNamara explained that the  
Office Committee had meant no dis-  
courtesy in moving the vote, as they  
had received the information required,  
and the claim was a just one.  
Messrs. Bradshaw, Morris, Harris,  
Anderson and the Chairman took part  
in the discussion, during which some  
cross firing was done.

With the granting of adjournments  
and passing of the pay rolls the meet-  
ing adjourned at 10.15 p.m.

Days Past—43 To Come—221  
WILLIAM and MARY proclaimed  
1689. While Stadtholder of Holland,  
William III. married Mary, eldest  
daughter of James II. When the lat-  
ter abdicated and fled the country,  
William was invited to succeed him  
and he and Mary were proclaimed on  
this day. There was resistance in  
Scotland and Ireland but James's  
cause was defeated in Ireland at the  
Battle of the Boyne, and in Scotland  
by measures that were not wanting  
in cruelty, as was shown by the Mas-  
sacre of Glencoe, 1692.

WAGNER died 1883, aged 70. Ger-  
man composer who revolutionized  
operatic methods by doing away with  
set ballads and choruses, and endeav-  
oring to give the same unity of ac-  
tion to an opera as would be realized  
in a play without music.

## Vessel With Coal Cargo

WAS JAMMED IN ICE FOR A WEEK.  
The schr. Annie Marcia came into  
port last evening from Louisburg,  
after an eventful trip which occupied  
fifteen days, bringing a cargo of coal  
to W. H. Hynes & Co. The vessel en-  
countered stormy weather at first and  
then met heavy ice and was jammed  
in the ice off Cape St. Vincent for  
a whole week, without making  
any progress whatever. It was an  
anxious time for those on board and  
as soon as the ice loosened the ves-  
sel came along quickly. The Annie  
Marcia left Louisburg a day after the  
schr. Fleetly, which was lost off the  
Nova Scotian coast ten days ago, her  
crew being taken off by a passing  
steamer. The Fleetly was also bound  
here with a cargo of 500 tons coal to  
Hynes & Co.
