### Opening of the Legislature.

This afternoon at three o'clock, His Excellency the Governor opens the Legislature. Some of the soldiers training for the Reserve Company of the Newfoundland Regiment, who are ailable in the city will form a guard

As was anticipated the Governor's Speech is largely taken up with the Great War, and what Newfoundland has been doing and what she will be called upon to do as a Dominion of the Empire. Foremost among the latter is the making of provision to aid those who may be totally or parti-ally disabled on Active Service from carning their livelihood, and for the dependents of those who fall on the field of battle. This is a debt of honour incumbent on those for whom our brave soldiers and sailors have offered to sacrifice their all.

In spite of the extraordinary addition to taxation made twelve months the Governor's Speech declares that the Revenue for the fiscal year ending in June 30th last showed deficit. As the fiscal year terminate before there was any expectation of the outbreak of war, the deficit can in no way be attributed to it. It is attributable directly to the policy of ex travagance, which has been so round ly condemned by the Opposition dur ing the past six years and the rushing into vast obligations without counting the cost. It is the natural result of blind financing.

What is far more serious is that brought to a sharp turn by the additional difficulties and dislocations of war, and it will be no surprise to the public to learn of the Government's admission that "even a greater shortage is apprehended." We believe that the shortage of last June was about a quarter of a million dollars. We would not be surprised to find a shortage of three quarters of a million on current account next June. The Government announce that they intend to utilize the Cash of the Colony to reduce this adverse balance. This will wipe out the Half Million Dollars Sir Robert Bond husbanded so carefully. But this will not suffice, and the Government propose to add to the taxation so greatly increased last spring and further increased last September, by new taxation. The Speech also foreshadows considerable curtailment in the grants of supplies. Little reference is made to other legislation, but the handy annual crops up as usual. The Government are ne-gotiating with a corporation for the establishment of a large industry in the interior. Rumor says it is to extract nitrogan from the air for the manufacture of nitrates.

THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH. Mr. President and Honourable Gentle-ment of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

# 6 Times

SENATORS TO A MAXIMUM OF

Ottawa, March 24.—Sir Robert Boren has given notice of a resolution n the form of an address to the King for an amendment to the constitution. It asks that the British North America Act, 1867, be amended, first, to increase the number of senators from seventy-two to ninety-six. Although seventy-two was the number fixed in 1867, there have been several increases since up to the present total of eighty-seven. The amendment will thus provide an increase of nine. The nine will be made up by increasing the representation of Manitoba from four to six; of Saskatchewan from four to six; of Alberta from four to six, and of British Columbia from

three to six. It is proposed that the divisions of Canada in relation to the constitution of the senate be increased from three to four-the fourth to comprise the vestern provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. The eastern divisions will be Ontario. Quebec and the maritime provinces each with twenty-four, and the new western division will also have twenty-four, the representation in the senate by provinces being:

crease the number of persons whom, by section 26 of the B. N. A., the governor-in-council, by direction of the king, may add to the senate. The number is now three to six. It is proposed to raise it to four or eight, with the old provision that no me appointments be added until the various divisions get back to their limit of twenty-four each.

The address asks that the number of senators do not at any time exceed

It proposes that if Newfoundland be admitted into confederation it have six senators instead of four as provided in 1867. This would bring the onstitution of the senate up to a 102 with a maximum of 110 possible

through eight extra appointments. The address includes the proposal that the number of representatives of a province in the commons do not fall below the total number of senators from such province. This will prevent the threatened reduction in the representation of Prince Edward Island in the lower house.
