Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—I notice in passing up  
the West End Promenade that the  
trees on the side near the Reid Com-  
pany are getting thinned out stead-  
ily, and I think it is time for the  
Council, who appear to be sound  
asleep, to wake up and put a fence  
from the Round House to the Reid  
Garage; one with no gates would be  
necessary. Last summer an engine
