## New Germicide.

## WHEN IT COMES.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 30.  
The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger, a copy of  
which has been received here, says  
Dr. Richard von Kuhlmann, former  
German Secretary of Foreign Affairs,  
will be one of the German representa-  
tives at the peace conference.

## MORE REBELLION.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 30.  
Advices received by Dutch news-  
papers from Cetinje, Montenegro, by  
way of Vienna, says the insurgent  
rising in Montenegro is spreading.  
Armed bands have occupied Niksic,  
Berano and Rojevica, and the Austro-  
Hungarians are evacuating the entire  
country hastily.

## VICTORIOUS IN ITALY.

LONDON, Oct. 31.  
British forces fighting east of the  
Piave have reached the Livina River  
at Francenigo, and the Italians have  
occupied Oderzo according to an of-  
ficial statement on Operations in Italy  
issued at the war office to-day.

## CZECHO-SLOVAKS BUSY.

PARIS, Oct. 31.  
Communication between Agram and  
Fiume and Budapest and Vienna has  
been restored. The Czecho-Slovak  
Slovaks have cut the railroad between  
Berlin and Vienna, near Bodenbach,  
and German trains can go only as far  
as Schiedau, according to a Zurich  
despatch to the Journal.

## TOTAL SEPARATION.

PARIS, Oct. 31.  
The Croatian Parliament at Agram  
has voted for a total separation of  
Croatia, Slavonia and Dalmatia from  
Hungary. According to a Geneva de-  
spatch to the Matin. "The despatch  
says that Agram is decked in national  
colors and that the people are cele-  
brating the passage of the resolutions."

## WILL BE WITHDRAWN.

VIENNA, Oct. 30.  
(Via London, 31.)—Austrian troops  
fighting on Italian soil will be with-  
drawn, according to an official state-  
ment issued by the war office to-night.  
In the Italian theatre there has been  
only minor fighting activity on the  
Tyrolean front. Between the Brenna  
and the Piave fresh and superior ene-  
my forces attacked Monte Asquale  
and Monte Pertica. Our troops with  
unexampled and soldiers' faithfulness  
brought all the enemy's efforts to naught.

## NEMESIS.

PARIS, Oct. 31.  
The German Empress is very ill  
and weak, according to a Berne de-  
spatch to the Petit Journal. It is  
said that she is haunted by the mem-  
ory of the Russian revolution, and in-  
spired upon the abdication of the Em-  
peror.

## ALARM IN BUDAPEST.

ZURICH, Oct. 31.  
The rapid advance of the Allies in  
Serbia is causing the greatest alarm  
in Budapest, according to a Vienna  
despatch. It is feared that the Jug-  
oslavians will cross the Croatian frontier,  
join the Allied troops and march on  
their territory. This is one of the  
reasons for the persistence with which  
Count Andrássy has asked for an arm-  
istice.

## PACIFISTS SHOULD BE SHOT.

LONDON, Oct. 30.  
That the immediate release of all  
British prisoners will be insisted upon  
on by the Government, as part of the  
armistice terms, is confidently ex-  
pected here. Sir George Cave, the  
Home Secretary, announced in the  
House of Commons yesterday that the  
Government would insist upon the  
release of all British prisoners upon  
Bulgaria in this matter would be insisted  
upon in any truce with Germany or  
Austria, and General Allenby had  
been told to follow the same  
policy in dealing with the Turks.  
Such a demand will be a very impor-  
tant factor, and it is not likely that  
the other Allies will show less re-  
gard for their nationals who are suf-  
fering in German camps. Even since  
the German peace overtures, were  
launched they have not tended to in-  
still any spirit of conciliation, for-  
giveness or leniency toward the en-  
emy in British breasts. Yesterday,  
discussions in the House of Commons  
of the treatment of the British pris-  
oners appeared to have been about  
the last straw breaking the back of  
British patience, which the country  
generally seems to think has been  
carried much too far. The Germans  
have only themselves to blame that  
these revelations came at a time so  
unfortunate for German interests. Old  
Parliamentary reporters say that  
they have never seen such a bitter and  
stronger feeling pervade the House of

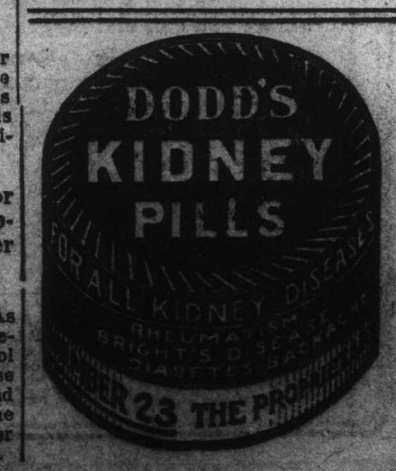
