style herring in a more advantageous position in the New York market, and there are other circumstances which are very likely to contribute to the success of Newfoundland herring here during the remainder of the season. These developments come at a time when the market is laboring under unfavorable conditions. It is reported from Norway that over a million barrels of herring of the old pack, and perhaps as much of the new pack are about to be sold to Germany and other nations of Central Europe. From other sources comes the advice that the European demand is assuming unheard of proportions. This would indicate that if the Peace Treaty is signed within the next few weeks that a great movement of herring from Scotland and Holland will be undertaken. These outside conditions have a direct bearing on the herring market in New York, and factors in the trade doubtless will recognize their importance. It is estimated that there are about 25,000 barrels of Newfoundland Scotch cured herring available for distribution in the American market, the bulk of it in first or second hands in Newfoundland or Canada. The stock in New York is not as heavy as many have estimated, and since this grade is the only satisfacory Scotch style herring on the spot, it may be expected that the demand will improve rather than grow worse as the summer season passes and the fall demand begins. Holders have been selling stocks of ordinary quality Newfoundland Scotch style herring here at a range between \$18@20 per barrel. In isolated cases sales of fancy quality have been made at




