

Turned From Asylum.

Severe comment was passed by Judge Morris and Inspector General Hutchings on the Superintendent of the Poor Asylum in the Central District Court to-day. The cause was the refusal of Superintendent Miller to admit to the Asylum an aged man named Patrick Savage because of some technicalities. Savage, who is 87 years of age and is in his dotage, appeared recently before the court for vacancy, and was ordered to be sent to the Poor Asylum. He was taken there in a cab but was refused admission and was brought back to the Police Station. Savage was again subsequently sent up to the Asylum and those who took him had orders to leave him there. He was, according to Superintendent Grimes in court this morning, later found wandering about the streets.

Inspector General Hutchings said there seemed to be more discipline at the Asylum than in the Police Force. His Honor said it was the duty of the Superintendent to keep Savage there, and he would give him one more chance. If he did not take the unfortunate man back he would report the matter to His Excellency the Governor and would have it investigated.

Savage was ordered to be sent to the Poor Asylum with instructions to the Superintendent to admit him and look after him.

No Men at Badger.
