

Rev. Gerald J. McShane, D.D., S.S., Pastor of St. Patrick's Church, ane an address to the local Rotarians at the Windsor Hotel scored the one room apartment, as one of the great factors in the problems of Montreal's

Father McShane spoke on the underrivileged child. He gave a page out of his own life describing the work the spiritual care of a group of people whose homes lie between the waterfront and Pine Avenue and between Mountain Street and Amherst," Rev.

For the thousands of orphans true home atmosphere must be developed and this Rev. McShane and his assistants had tried to do in St. Patrick's parish. "The very best child in an orphan asylum is not equal to a child with a real home, with a father and mother. We have tried to establish a home atmosphere in our institut ons."

No rigid discipline, bright class coms, a certain amount of distracting manual labor, neat family-like dining rooms, no un forms, all serve to give the children an atmosphere that is akin to the true home, the speaker said.
