## Two Newfoundland Fishermen Lost on Mizzen Bank

**\$100,000 Fire in Quebec Province—Former Belgian Finance Minister Will Try to Form a Ministry.—20 Conspirators Sentenced to Death in Bulgaria.**

**WILD FISHERMEN LOST.**  
NORTH SYDNEY, May 8. The loss of two fishermen, William Robert and Charles Grandy, both of St. John's, Newfoundland, from the schooner Vera P. Thornhill, Captain James Anster, on the Mizzen Bank on Friday, was reported here to-day. The schooner was reported to have been lost in a heavy fog while towing trawls.

**MILLION DOLLAR FIRE.**  
QUEBEC, May 8. Twenty-three stores and residences, including picture houses, offices and doctors, one bank, and one theatre, constitute the toll of the conflagration that swept the town of St. Charles d'Alma 125 miles north of Quebec to-day. The monetary damage was estimated to exceed \$1,000,000. The town comprised about seventy buildings and over half of the buildings had been either completely destroyed or seriously injured. The fire started in a moving picture theatre and spread rapidly to the other buildings.

**STRANGE SUGGESTION.**  
NEW YORK, May 8. The Chamber of Commerce of New York State has refused to sponsor the showing throughout the United States of a painting having Christ as its central figure. The picture, sixteen feet by six, is symbolic of the idea that religion is the hope of civilization.

**THROWN FROM CAR AND DROWNED.**  
CLOVERDALE, Que., May 8. When their car skidded and turned over in a ditch of water, Mr. and Mrs. John Chapman, of Vancouver, were drowned last night near here.

**THREE AIRMEN MISSING.**  
FAIRBANKS, Alaska, May 8. An airplane carrying three men, which Wednesday made the farthest north flight recorded, was reported lost between Rampart, eighty miles northwest of Fairbanks, and Brooks, fifty miles east of Rampart. A storm was raging last night when the plane failed to arrive at Rampart. Nothing is known of the condition of the men who were in the plane.

**DUKE OF RUTLAND DEAD.**  
LONDON, May 8. The Duke of Rutland, aged 78, died suddenly here to-day.

**VESSEL LOST WITH 25 HANDS.**  
MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 8. According to meagre reports reaching Memphis late to-day, twenty-five members of the crew of the Government vessel, Normand, lost their lives late to-day when the ship sank in the Mississippi River, at a point about 25 miles south of Memphis.

**CHURCH UNION VOTE.**  
TORONTO, May 8. The summary issued by the Church Union Bureau of Information to-day, reports that 1593 Presbyterian Churches and preaching places have voted in favor of concurrence in Church Union and 625 against.

**BELGIUM STILL WITHOUT A PREMIER.**  
BRUSSELS, May 8. Aloys Van De Vyvere, former Belgian Finance Minister, to-day agreed to attempt to form a Cabinet to succeed that of former Premier Theunis, which resigned April 5.

**BRUTAL MURDER.**  
ST. GEORGE, N.B., May 8. A Hanselpecker, 70 year old store-keeper, at Bethel, a small settlement five miles from here, was brutally murdered outside his home this afternoon, and to-night police and others are scouring this section in search of a mysterious young man who is supposed to have knowledge of the crime. Hanselpecker's head was smashed to pulp, apparently by a beechwood club, found near the barn marked with blood and finger prints. The young man sought in connection with the crime helped Hanselpecker, it is thought, to cut some wood. After killing the old man the murderer entered the house and rifled the small cash drawer.

**MUSSOLINI TAKES NAVY PORTFOLIO.**  
ROME, May 8. It was officially announced to-day that King Victor Emmanuel had accepted the resignation of Minister of the Navy, Thibon De Rovet, and entrusted the Naval portfolio to Premier Mussolini, who will take the oath of office for that post before the King to-morrow.

**THE SITUATION IN MOROCCO.**  
PARIS, May 8. The situation in French Morocco, where Marshal Lyautey is endeavoring to drive Abdel Krim's Rifian invaders back into the Spanish zone, is said in latest despatches to be as satisfactory as possible. The Rifians, however, are giving the French more trouble than was expected, and are reported to be receiving reinforcements, notably on the French left wing, where up to the present not much difficulty had been met with.

**COMMUNISTS PREPARE A RECEPTION FOR HINDENBURG.**  
BERLIN, May 8. The Communists in the capital are arranging to stage an open air demonstration against Field Marshal Von Hindenburg next Monday, at the hour of his arrival in the capital. Meanwhile the Nationalist organizations are going ahead with the plans for a great reception for the President.

**ADVENTURES IN MEXICO.**  
MEXICO CITY, May 8. Frank Doughty, Gwen Waterland and Elizabeth Heat, the British subjects who were held captive by bandits for three days in the mountains near Cuautla, in the State of Morelos, have arrived here. They said they were well treated, except by mosquitoes. Doughty and the two women were captured by three armed men, who took them to the wooded part of the mountains. The bandits demanded \$25,000 ransom, but later reduced the amount to \$4,000. Early Wednesday morning, on the approach of cavalry forces sent to the rescue, the bandits fled and the captives made their way back to Cuautla.

**FRENCH VIEWS OF ENGLAND'S ATTITUDE.**  
PARIS, May 8. "England opposes the control of warships and airplanes"; "England demands freedom of commerce for warships"; and variants of the same idea are the headlines appearing over despatches in to-day's Paris newspapers, telling of the developments at the Geneva conference for the control of traffic in arms.

**AMUNDSEN HELD UP BY UNFAVORABLE WEATHER.**  
NEW YORK, May 8. Unfavorable weather is believed to be holding the Amundsen Polar aerial expedition to its base at King's Bay, Svalbergen. A brief message from that lonely point in the Arctic, received by the Meteorological Observatory at Oslo, the Norwegian capital, last night, said that the explorer and his party had postponed their start which had been planned for to-day.

**KILLED BY DYNAMITE CHARGE.**  
QUEBEC, May 8. Joseph Pelchat was killed when he failed to get away in time when a charge of dynamite was set off to check a fire which last night and this morning destroyed half a hundred buildings and cause damage amounting to a million and a quarter dollars, at St. Joseph d'Alma. Pelchat was warned but did not get away before the charge went off.

**WATER DELAYS AMUNDSEN.**  
OSIO, May 8. Repairs on the north report favorable weather conditions that may delay for several days the attempt of Captain Raold Amundsen to fly to the North Pole. Continual rain is expected during the next few days in the region where the expedition expects to start, the dispatch adds.

**SPECTACULAR METHODS.**  
DESMOINES, Iowa, May 8. A weekly motor truck parade of hooded bootleggers confined in the city, reminiscent of old Puritan days, was held by Chief Police Cavender to the public of bootleggers' true place in society. Announcement to effect followed a street parade of hooded automobiles containing poisonous gas as death and holding a half bottle labelled hooch. Chief Cavender said to-day he was arranging to build large stocks of such as were in Puritan days. He said it was his plan to place all bootleggers arrested in the stocks with appropriate signs and parade them in trucks through the city as an example.

"The political genius of our race showed its greatness in this, that although the man in the street could probably not dissect one of the balance sheets which the chartered accountant understood in one blink of the eye or grasp the meaning of the curving lines so dear to the graphophiles, he knew instinctively that finance, the movements of trade, instabilities of currency were the questions of the hour, and he therefore listened more carefully to what pundits of finance had to say than his favourite political orators.

SOFIA, May 8. The Public Prosecutor, addressing the Court Martial to-day, demanded the death penalty for four of the prisoners being tried on a charge of complicity in the Sveti Kral Cathedral bombing tragedy. The extreme penalty was asked against Maroo Friedman and Paer Peter Zadgorski as having prepared the outrage, and against Georgi Koueff and Dimitir Daskaloff, for harbouring the actual criminals after the crime.
