Last evening a meeting of the electors of Elora was held in the Drill Shed, charles Horning, Esq., in the chair, and Mr Shaw acting as secretary. Messrs Dobbin and Loghrin addressed the meeting in full explanation of their position, and requested the electors to question them. Mr Rich'd Taylor put a series of questions to Mr. Loghrin respecting the Convention, and that gentleman was compelled to acknowledge the nomination of Mr. Dobbin unanimous, and that there was really no valid ground for his appearance in the field. Mr Chas.
