The question of Municipal Assessment is now occupying much attention in various towns and cities in Ontario. It has received a good deal of notice from the press, and was taken up, and discussed at a meeting of the Toronto Board of Trade, specially called for the purpose on Friday last. The feeling of that meeting was nearly unanimous in opposition to the assessment of bank stock as an im-politic and unjust kind of taxation for municipal purposes. A resolution affirming this view was passed without opposi-tion. Another resolution asserting the expediency of levying taxes for local purposes only on real estate was very fully discussed and carried. A resolution was also passed expressing the opinion of the board that all the existing exemp-tions from city taxation should be abol-ished.—*Monetary Times.*
