VIVIAN AND ROCHE WERE PRETTY MUCH IN THE LIMELIGHT AT EDMONTON, WINNING AN UPHILL GAME FOR THE BRONKS

Even Johnnie Brennan's Presence in Eskimos' Camp Couldn't Stop Bronks from Winning; Timely Swats Were Where the Eskimo Fielders Were Not

Edmonton, Alta., July 22.—Calgary won by hitting the pill at opportune moments and by hitting it in places where the Edmonton men should have been, but were not. The contest raged for seven innings in rain and mud, and started with the eighth, but darkness fell upon the diamond park, and Umpire Longenecker mercifully called the game.
The presence of Johnnie Brennan, formerly with the Victoria team in the Northwestern league, and for several years the star third baseman of the Western Canada league, made the Edmonton infield much stronger on that side of the diamond, but Dudley, who filled in at shortstop, and who was more ground than would bury a baby rabbit, threw or four of the Calgary hits went through the shortstop position.
Calgary was behind at the end of the fifth inning, and the damp feeling of the atmosphere predicted rain. It did not fall, however, and the Bronks proceeded to overcome the lead of the Mackinacs.
Edmonton had secured its runs in the second and fourth. In the second Brennan was walked and stole second. White singled and Brennan scored. In the fourth Brennan was again walked. Standridge allowed the ball to slip from his fingers on Slick's throw. He went to third on White's grounds to Standridge, and came home on Porter's sacrifice fly to Piper.
In the fifth Dudley failed to hold Roche's ground. Vivian drove a hot one through short. Roche sole third. Piper drove one to Brennan and fell behind to the throw, Roche scoring.
In the sixth Standridge hit a two pipe Longenecker.

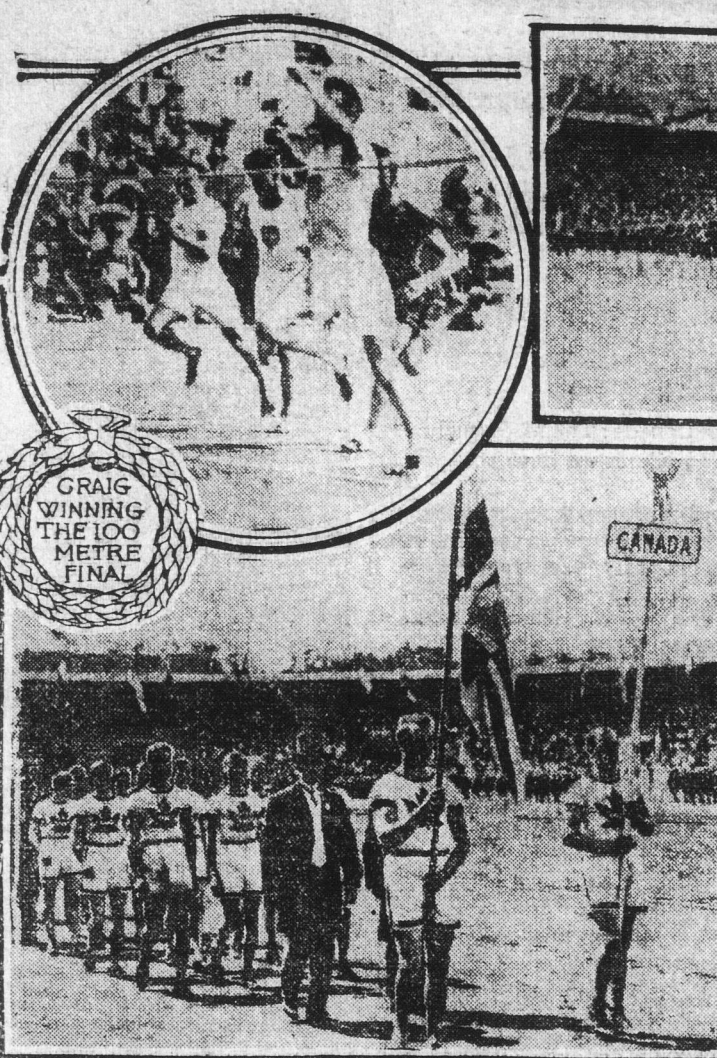

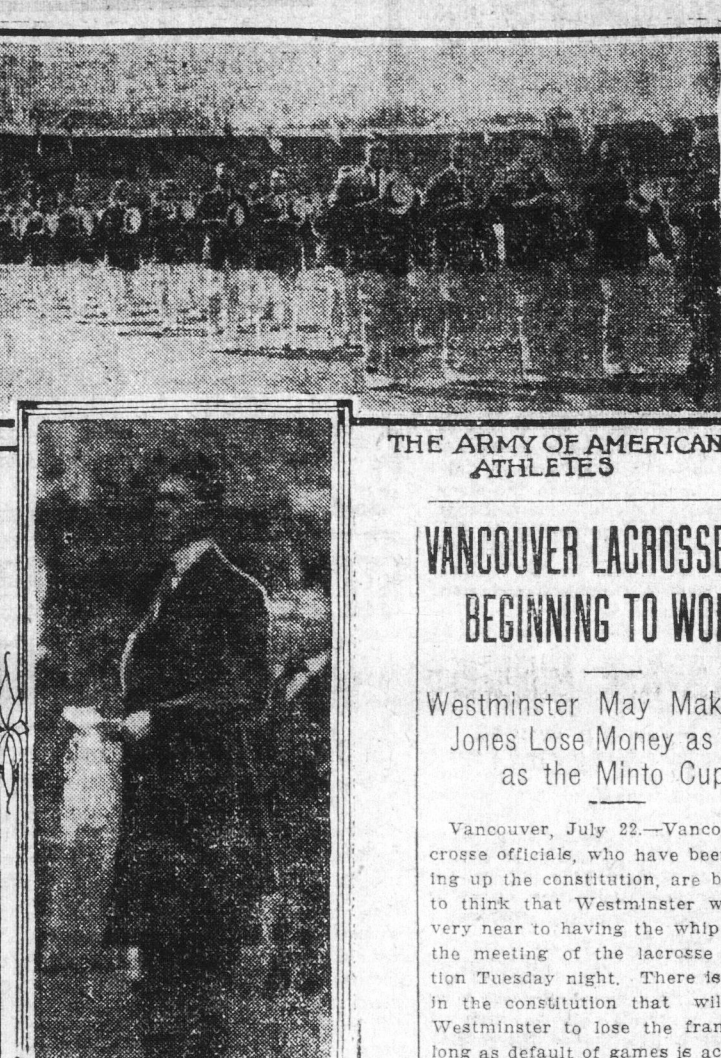

VANCOUVER LACROSSE MEN BEGINNING TO WORRY

Westminster May Make Con Jones Lose Money as Well as the Minto Cup

Vancouver, July 22.—Vancouver lacrosse officials, who have been studying up the constitution, are beginning to think that Westminster will come very near to having the whip hand at the meeting of the lacrosse association Tuesday night. There is nothing in the constitution that will cause Westminster to lose the franchise so long as default of games is accompanied by forfeiture of five hundred dollars by Westminster.
Con Jones, the Vancouver manager, has hotly declared that he won't play Westminster again, but above this he does not wish to lose the Minto Cup by forfeit, nor can he well afford to abandon all the games of the Westminster schedule.
The greatest fear of Vancouver officials is now that next Saturday Vancouver will go to Westminster and play for a small game, and that again, two weeks from now, when a game is scheduled for Vancouver, Westminster will again default, to the great financial loss of the Vancouver management and much painful disgust of fans.
Vancouver now controls a majority vote in the association, and a possible solution of the trouble from a Vancouver standpoint may be that Tuesday's meeting will change the schedule in order that the next four or five meetings will be played in Vancouver, and the Vancouver officials think that would put things up to Westminster.
The defaulting games by Westminster would then probably be forced, and the season would end without Vancouver being put in jeopardy of losing the cup by an adverse award by the "trustees" in the meantime Con Jones is figuring on bringing two or three eastern teams to the coast. One thing the row has done, and that is, stimulated interest greatly in the game. Record games would be guaranteed in Vancouver if the teams played here every Saturday during the remainder of the season.

PERSONS MAY GO TO THE TACOMA CLUB

Vancouver, July 22.—Claiming that President Bob Brown of the Vancouver Club accepted the terms offered, and that Pitchers Agnew and Bedford and Outfielders Persons are now his property in exchange for Charlie Schmitz, Owner Ed Watkins of the Tacoma club will submit his case to President Fielder Jones of the Northwest league unless the Vancouver club goes through with its end of the transaction.
A Tacoma dispatch says that Watkins is prepared to fight the case and claims that the telegrams he holds clinches the deal under baseball rules. The local magnate had nothing to say last evening concerning the trade, but he is said to be greatly interested in the deal, and is said to be a full-fledged member of the local club within the next few days.
Bedford, Agnew and Persons left last night for Tacoma, where they will talk over things with the Tacoma management.

MY WORST BLUNDER

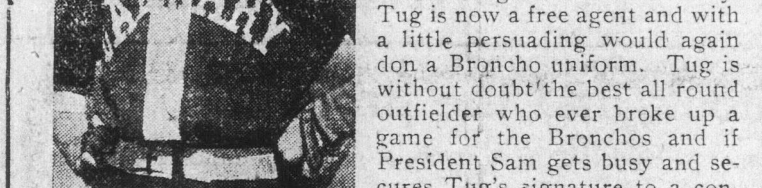
Famous "Bonehead" Plays on Major League Diamonds Explained by Leading Baseball Players to

Do you want to get water's cramp? If I ever start to write the mistakes I've made in baseball games I'll ruin my throwing arm by paralyzing it. I've made enough to run in ten volumes and I don't think the Boston crowd ever have forgotten one of them.
I'm afraid you only want me to tell the worst one I ever made. I doubt if I pick the right one, even then, but I remember one that couldn't be improved upon much as to its worseness. It was so bad it was almost good, and by the way, there are a lot of times when you can't tell whether a play is good or bad. If it turns out to be right it's good, and if not, you're a John Anderson for fair. The mistake I made was about the most natural in the world, but it should be told, what would have happened to me if I had pulled me through. The game was played in Boston last year, against Brooklyn, I believe, although I can't remember which team it was. Anyhow we both were slugging the ball hard and going at top speed. I was up to bat, and I had a lead, leading, then the other. Along in the eighth inning we had two men on the bases and I came to bat. I caught the first ball pitched and hit it several times with my hands. I turned first base while the ball still was in the air, and saw that he had no chance to hold it if he made a sensational catch, and I turned for second during the last half of the first. The ball just hit me on the hands hard enough to make me feel that I was going to get water's cramp. I reached third, and slid back to second. The ball came back, and I was away with a big lead. I thought I was watching me at all, and I slid into third base just as hard as I could. I was driven back to third, and I ran back toward second. I turned back to third and I was trapped. I was second and third and they were both the runners on the bases had made another break for the plate. The throw went high and wild, and the over the plate with the run and I was driven back to third. I was hit with a runner already there. I hit the ball so hard I took it for granted both the runners on the bases had scored and never had figured it out. No wonder the pitcher let me get away. The runner who had been chasing me up and down when he was on second had figured that the left fielder would catch the ball and stop it at third instead of going home. So long as we got away with it it was a good play and we made four runs that inning instead of one and we were the same, so that made it four times as good. I never tried again, and every time I make a hit I take a large look ahead to see if the ball is set or the way clear before making any more smart stunts.
