ROD. As useful a way as any to help the reader to cast a fly will be to describe how the writer has tried to help him.

The boy takes the rod, fitted with its reel and line only, to a water's edge free of bushes or trees, or to a lawn recently mowed. If the grass is slightly damp, all the better, as it holds the line more nearly as does the water.

He pulls off from the reel enough line so that the free part shall be once and a half or twice the length of the rod. This he throws up before him, as well as he can. He then tries with a quick movement of the wrist, with as little movement of the forearm as possible, to lift the line upward and backward until it straightens out behind him, and then with another similar motion to make it go straight out before him.

Do not try to make the forward cast on just the same plane as the backward cast, for fear that the end of the line should snap like a whip-lash, which, if you were actually fishing, would crack off your flies pretty certainly.

Therefore make the lift of the back inward toward the body is the more natural, and deliver the forward cast straight out toward its destination. But always aim about your own height above the spot on the water you mean to reach, to insure the line falling lightly.

THE TURF. AT NEWMARKET. London, May 20.—At the third day's racing of the Newmarket second spring meeting, Mr. F. Benson's br. c. Duquesne won August Belmont's chestnut colt Bridgman II. finished second, and the Lord-Lord-Beresford stables' bay colt Bala won third. In the race for the 500 sovereigns (400 sovereigns to the owner and 100 sovereigns to the jockey) the winner was added to a sweepstakes of 10 sovereigns each for starters. The race was won by 2-1 odds, over the Rous course (5 furlongs).

A GAME FOR BUSY BRAINS. Mr. Allan, who has won the amateur championship for 1897, has taught us another salutary lesson. It is often said that a golfer, to win first honors, must give his whole attention to the game, which is best played with a vacant mind. DRAUGHTS. "THE MAID OF THE MILL." The final games of the Glasgow section of the match between Wylie and Martins were played on the 19th. The game upon which the little "book" has been published, and the spectators were pretty confident that a win would be secured by one or other of the players. Martins had the black pieces in the first of the two games, and in the course of the play he out-manoeuvred his opponent and gradually built up a splendid position, which left Wylie's pieces in scattered and weak form. He latterly won a man and the game amid the well-deserved applause of the spectators. The following was the play in the latter portion of the game: Black men on 10, 13, 15, 21, 23, 25. Martins now had to take the white men in the same opening, theoretically the stronger side, but the game ended in a draw. Thus the Glasgow section of the match finished on the "Red Ladies" favor, the score being: Wylie 6, Martins 2, drawn 18. At the conclusion of the 26th game Mr. Bryson, who had acted as treasurer and manager, said that the

attendance had been better than had been expected, and the attention shown to the games had evinced the deep interest taken in the splendid display of draughts strategy made by the two veterans. It only remained for him to hand over the proceeds of the Glasgow subscriptions (£60), which it had been decided to divide equally. The second half of the match begins in Manchester on the 22nd inst.

Clean Sweep. A Town in Japan Wiped Out by Fire. Four Thousand Houses Destroyed and Forty or Fifty Lives Lost.

Victoria, B. C., May 21.—The steamer Empress of India, from Yokohama, brought news of a fire which completely destroyed the town of Hoshioguchi, in the silk district of Japan. Nearly 4,000 houses were destroyed, and between 40 and 50 lives were lost.

All the houses were frail wooden structures, and the fire took but a short time to sweep the town, giving the helpless members of the community little chance to escape.

SIMCOE SHOOTING AFFRAY. That may Prove Fatal—Concussion in Jail.

Simcoe, May 21.—Chas. Plummer, who lives on the west town line of Charlotteville, shot a man named Wm. Bedford on Wednesday, and then started toward Simcoe to give himself up. Dr. Tidale, of Lynedoch, who was called to attend the wounded man, telegraphed to County Crown Attorney Ansley that the wounds were probably from the muzzle of a revolver, and that Plummer was dispatched to look up Plummer.

Mr. Mabey saw Plummer in town and took him to jail. He was up before Police Magistrate Beemer and remanded for a week to await the outcome of Bedford's injuries.

There are several stories as to the cause of the shooting. One is to the effect that Bedford had been terrorizing the neighborhood for some time and that Plummer called him down. Another is that he was making himself too familiar around the Plummer household, and as a consequence encountered the business end of Mr. Plummer's gun. At any rate, he now carries a charge of manslaughter, and may not recover from the effects of it. Both men are colored.

West Nisouri Township Council. Council met on usual night, all members present. The minutes of the former meeting were read and confirmed. Communications were received from the mayor of Sault Ste. Marie re duty on pulp wood; petition signed by reeve and clerk and forwarded.

From Widow McDuff for compensation for right of way through her farm in 1895 during snow-drift. No action taken. A. Fisher was paid \$7.20 for gravel. Michael Holden was paid \$15 for maintenance and attendance on John Near, a sick patient, for five weeks. Mr. Powell addressed the council, claiming damages for inconvenience caused by the cutting of the hill on town line opposite his farm, depriving him of egress or ingress. Mr. Salmon was authorized to confer with the Board of Commissioners on the matter. On motion of Mr. Taylor, seconded by Mr. Smith, \$100 was granted for repairing the Government road, North Dorchester giving a like amount. Mr. Vanderburgh addressed the council, asking the repeal of a law prohibiting parties on bicycles to travel on the sidewalks or footpaths throughout the township. No action was taken. The council authorized D. A. Thompson to apply for services of the township engineer re drain with which there appears to be some slight or ten persons connected. The men were paid their fees for attendance in council. Adjourned till the 31st inst. Wm. Lee, Clerk.

The Court of Appeal maintained the decision of Justice Davidson and dismissed the action of the Bell Telephone Company against the Montreal Street Railway Company. The former sued for \$27,000, expenses up to the date of institution of action incurred to counteract the effects of laying the street railway wires too close to the telephone wires.

Death on the Rail.

An Old Man Killed Near Port Dover Junction.

Three Michigan Central Brakemen More or Less Injured.

Port Dover, May 21.—John Glover, 60 years of age, was killed a mile and a half west of Port Dover Junction yesterday morning. He was walking on the M. C. R. track, and was struck by No. 37, M. C. R. express, and instantly killed. The train struck the man while he was walking in one township and threw him into the adjoining township, and the question will arise what coroner, if any, will act.

The deceased was a widower, but has three daughters living. St. Thomas, May 21.—Mr. W. Stringer, brakeman on the M. C. R. St. Clair branch local, had his foot injured at Weidman yesterday morning. The injury is only slight.

Joseph Smith, M. C. R. brakeman, while getting on a moving train at Chippewa, missed his footing and hung on. His knee struck the step and was severely bruised. He was brought here and taken to the hospital, where Dr. Smith attended to his injuries.

O. Masterman, Manitoba street, a brakeman on the M. C. R., while running to turn a switch, fell, and striking his knee on a tie, injured it severely. He will be laid up for some time.
