of Conservative agents exists and that the
election will be upset.

—Partnership in ocean cables is not so
profitable as some people make out. It is
not generally known that only seven out of
the seventeen transatlantic cables are now
in use—ten having given out for various
causes. Estimating the cost of each cable
at \$3,000,000, here is an unrecouped in-
vestment of \$30,000,000 safely buried
beneath the ocean to a depth of from a few
fathoms to over five miles.

IS A DOMINION GENERAL ELEC- TION AT HAND?

An Ottawa correspondent reports that
the Dominion Parliament will be dissolved
at the end of the present year or in the
early months of 1895, and that the issue
chosen by the Administration will be one
raised in the colonial conference, now in
session at the capital. There may or may
not be truth in this statement. But three
facts may well be borne in mind in this
connection:

1. At the last general election, the Con-
servative leaders dissolved the House on a
false and misleading cry that they were
about to procure reciprocity with the
United States, and that they desired to
receive the mandate of the electors.

2. If they had not dissolved Parliament
suddenly, time would have been given to
expose the duplicity of the men in power,
and they would have been defeated by an
indignant electorate.

3. It is possible that somewhat similar
tactics may be adopted. At the request of
the Ottawa authorities, the colonial con-
ference is now being held in secret. So
long as the Star Chamber idea is main-
tained, it is possible to put any coloring on
the proceedings that interested parties
may deem for the welfare of their party.
And it is even possible for a hard-boiled
Government, like that now holding sway
at Ottawa, to go to the country with a cry
that would, in the absence of the full re-
port of the proceedings, be proved to be as
unwarranted as that raised in the 1891
election. The friends of a tariff reform
that shall provide taxation for revenue
only, and not for the benefit of a few rich
supporters of the Administration, should
be on their guard and ready for an
emergency. There can be no doubt that
the men at Ottawa are getting ready for a
general election, to be decreed at their
convenience. They have had needy M.P.s
at work preparing campaign literature for
months past. That line of action shows
what may be expected before a very long
slap.

EXTRAVAGANCE RUN WILD IN CANADIAN MILITIA AFFAIRS.

The announcement that Col. Powell,
adjutant-general of the Canadian militia,
a native Canadian and a U. E. Loyalist, has
been suspended because he failed to comply
with a red-tape regulation, has caused a
good deal of comment throughout the
country, but not more than has done the
statement that it is probable that Lieut.
Col. Aymer will be passed over when a
successor Col. Powell is appointed.

Col. Aymer is now assistant adjutant-
general, and therefore the officer next in
seniority to the suspended adjutant-
general. Col. Aymer is a Canadian officer
of undoubted merit and ability, as
all who came in contact with him
while in this city know. Lieut.-Col. Lake,
quartermaster-general, recently brought
from England, and pitchforked into
one of the best positions in the gift of the
Government at Ottawa, over the heads of
many capable Canadians, is alleged to be
slated for the vacant office. It would be a
great wrong to Col. Aymer if his right to
promotion were ignored and Col. Lake were
made adjutant-general.

It seems to be the fixed policy of the
Government at Ottawa to regard the better
class of officers—the prizes in the militia
service—as too good for Canadians. If that
is to be the rule then we may as well
abolish the military college at Kingston im-
mediately. That institution was established
twenty years ago for the purpose of im-
parting a purely military education in
order that Canadians might qualify to fill
any position in the military service of the
Dominion. How the expenses of the col-
lege have been heaped up, and with what
results, was brought out in the recent
debate. The troubles now exposed still
further accentuate the unsatisfactory con-
dition of affairs. When it was decided to
establish the college, Parliament was
assured that a staff for this purpose would
consist of not more than three professors,
and that the cost would be about \$8,000 a
year, with some little extra outlay for
attendants, etc., and that no new buildings
would be required, as the work would be
done in connection with some of our
military organizations where buildings
already existed. This was the basis on
which Parliament agreed to the scheme.

Since then the annual expenditure has
grown to be eight times the original
estimate. Two years ago it had risen to
about \$63,000. Mr. Mulock, M.P., then
called the attention of the Government to
the tremendous increase, when the Minister
of Militia promised to direct the attention
of the Government to the matter with a
view to a reduction. The result was that
in the following year instead of a reduc-
tion the cost rose to over \$70,000. The
total number of students at the college at
the present time, as pointed out by Mr.
Mulock, when condemning the system in
Parliament the other evening, is 58, while
the staff and assistants deemed necessary
by the Dominion Government to take
charge of this number is 36, or more than
one official to every two students!

The total number of graduates since the
Military College started in 1895, with a
cost to date of \$1,271,602 24, or, in
other words, each graduate has cost
\$6,521. The original object was to impart
a purely military training, but this object
has been abandoned, and now the institu-
tion is doing the work of a collegiate
institute, and preparing students for
the church, professions, business, etc.

Only eleven graduates have been ap-
pointed to military positions in Canada, so
that for this enormous expenditure the
service has received the benefit of only
eleven persons trained at the college; that
is, the taxpayers of Canada have been
called upon to pay \$1,271,602 24 to turn
out eleven graduates now in the service of
the Dominion! None of the other gradu-
ates have made any use of their military
training in connection with the Canadian
militia. About 30 graduates are engaged
in the various Departments at Ottawa, but
their military education acquired at the
college is of no use because they are not
engaged in military work, so that practi-
cally all spent on them is thrown away.
Deducting from the cost of the college from
its commencement all moneys paid by
students for fees, the result is these eleven
graduates have cost the country \$90,153
each. One item of the expenditure last
year consisted of \$12,892, cost of purchas-
ing a residence for the commandant of the
college, Lieut.-Col. Cameron, brother-in-
law of Sir Herbert Tupper. This officer
is paid a salary of \$3,163 32; gets a free
house, the interest and repairs of which
cost \$1,000 a year to the country; free fuel,
free light, free water, free servants, etc.

In reply to this charge, and in answer
to the contention that the enormous ex-
penses should be cut down, allowing the
Provincial authorities to provide the ordi-
nary high school education now given at
the military college at such vast expense,
Mr. Patterson, the Minister of Militia,
says that the Government will not agree
to any reorganization looking to a reduction
in the expense. Thus we are to have a
military college conducted in the most ex-
travagant way, to have the militia force
credited with unnecessary expenditures for
alleged services rendered to it, while gradu-
ates of the College are boycotted when the
best officers are to be filled. Can any tax-
payer of Canada condone such management
of public affairs?

FROZEN MEAT FOR BRITAIN.

Unless Great Britain can be prevailed
upon to relax the rule that calls for the
slaughter of Canadian cattle immediately
upon landing, our cattle dealers will have
to follow the example of cattle exporters in
the United States and Australia and New
Zealand, and send their products over the
Atlantic in refrigerator steamers. How the
meat of our sister colonies is conveyed to
England is graphically described in a
recent issue of the London Engineer.

The steamer Perthshire, arrived in the
British metropolis, carried from Australia
and New Zealand the largest cargo of
frozen meat ever imported into Great
Britain. The cargo consisted of 70,000

carcasses of sheep, 9,000 haunches, 9,000
legs, about 550 tons of frozen beef, 750
cases of butter, 150 bags of bullocks'
hearts, 150 bags of ox tails and kidneys,
and seven cases of oysters. The holds
have sufficient capacity to have accommo-
dated 12,000 more carcasses of sheep. The
shipment is an interesting one, as it is the
first time meat has been taken to Britain
from Australia or New Zealand by means
of an ammonia machine, and the excellent
quality of the goods, as certified by the
consignees, is sufficient evidence of the
success of the Linde machines by which
the holds were cooled. Until recently only
cold air machines were used in this trade.
The ammonia machines occupy less space
and apply the cold in a much more efficient
manner, besides greatly reducing the con-
sumption of steam. The plant on the
Perthshire consists of two independent re-
frigerating machines on the Linde system,
each machine consisting of compound am-
monia compressor and an ammonia con-
denser combined on one bed plate with a
compound steam engine. The refrigerators
consist of a series of coils of wrought iron
tube, wound in long lengths without joint
from end to end. There are upward of
eight miles of wrought iron tubing in the
installation. The air is circulated by
means of fans, which draw the warmer air
from the hold, pass it over the refrigerator
coils and return it to the hold through
suitable trunks. It is claimed for this
system that the air is delivered into the
holds pure, dry and free from snow or
moisture. There are no pipes in the hold
whatever. The active circulation of air
thus inspired enables the temperature to be
kept extremely even; the variation between
different parts of the hold does not exceed
5 degrees Fahrenheit. In all probability
the proposed new Atlantic steamers, to run
between a Canadian port and the west
coast of England, will be fitted up with
similar appliances. They are costly, but
effective.
