BICYCLES

Old Riders Say Wheeling Is the Most Invigorating of All Outdoor Exercise.

Many persons who have demonstrated to their own satisfaction that cycling is the most beneficial and pleasant of all sports, have been surprised to hear their favorite pastime condemn-Batteries-Pappalau and Phelps; Od- ed by some friend who claims to have given the wheel a trial and found it wanting.
