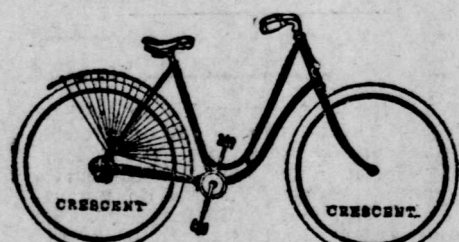

THE INTERNATIONAL.
Detroit Free Press: International League affairs are rapidly assuming tangible shape, and it is expected that the schedule will be out in a few days. There is no longer any doubt as to the ability of Port Huron business men to put their club on a solid basis, and Manager Ray Eddy has been playing good players in his dragnet, ready to haul it in at any time the word is given. The three Canadian clubs have their men signed, and many have reported exhibition games having been ready to be played by London, and Manager George Black will open up with his Chatham team this week, when the D. A. C. team will tackle the leaguers. Manager Fred Eddy has several good men for the Saginaw and C. A. Hitts, who is back of the Grand Rapids club, has not been idle by any means.

Some of the men Hitts has signed are: Birmingham, a first baseman, who was considered good enough for the Western League last year; Gulheen, an infielder, who was tried by Manning this spring, and who was highly recommended by the owners of the Kansas City team; a valuable man for an International League club; Shortstop Paddy Boyle, of Cleveland; Third Baseman Wolff, a hard hitter, who has played in the Interstate League; Tommy Gettiner, the left-handed outfielder, who is well known to Western League patrons; Catcher Baker, of Toledo, and Pitchers Hagerman, King and Riley, the first two being recommended by Manager Armore of the Dayton club. The Grand Rapids grounds will be moved at once, and the first practice game will be played Saturday and Sunday with the Columbus Giants. In Manager Hitts, Grand Rapids has a local club owner and a hustler, as his efforts in the past two weeks go to show, and the talent he has signed indicates that his team will cut some figure in the race.

DIAMOND JUBILEE A WINNER.
London, May 2.—The Two Thousand Guineas stakes, run at Newmarket today, was won by the Prince of Wales' Diamond Jubilee. Bona Rosa and Sidus finished second and third respectively in the field of ten.

Sir R. Waldo Griffiths' View Holia, ridden by Martin, led to the furlong post, when Diamond Jubilee drew easily clear, followed by Sidus, and making the remainder of the running, won easily by four lengths. The betting was 11 to 1 against Diamond Jubilee, 60 to 1 against Bona Rosa, and 100 to 1 against Sidus. L. Reiff rode Bona Rosa. This is the first time the Prince of Wales' entry has won the Two Thousand Guineas. His royal highness has now captured all the classic races with the exception of the Oaks stakes. After the running of the Two Thousand Guineas a host of leading jockeys in police and society crowded around the prince in the paddock. Removing his hat he shook hands with his friends and the officials of his stable and bowed repeatedly to the ringing cheers thrown in honor of him and Jockey Jones. Diamond Jubilee's attendant, who, though a mere stable lad, was given the mount in preference to the fashionable jockeys who had hitherto been unable to get the horse into a gallop.

BICYCLES
AND HEALTH

Old Riders Say Wheeling Is the Most Invigorating of All Outdoor Exercises.

Many persons who have demonstrated to their own satisfaction that cycling is the most beneficial and pleasant of all sports, have been surprised to hear their favorite pastime condemned by some friend who claims to have given the wheel a trial and found it wanting.

Very few of these advocates of the wheel ever analyzed the objections and demonstrated that the use of the bicycle was not the cause of their friend's opinion, but that the trouble lay in the abuse of it. A little investigation will prove that this is the case nine times out of ten and that had many people that had enlisted in the ranks of those opposed to cycling been properly initiated into the sport they would now be enthusiasts of the first water.

Usually the beginner, graduating from the riding school, starts out by utterly disregarding the old adage that "One must creep before one can walk." He knows Mr. Oldier, who isn't near as strong as he is, and easily rides 40 or 50 miles a day; or she remembers how Miss Chainless rode three centuries last season, and she is only a little thing; so there is no earthly reason why they shouldn't ride 20 or 30 miles on their first outing. They do not take into consideration that many of the muscles brought into play in wheel riding are ordinarily little used, and consequently are not prepared for the unusual strain about to be imposed upon them.

In walking, the weight of the body is carried by the lower limbs; the swinging of the arms, the swinging of the legs, the rhythmic motion of the feet, all relieve muscles that in cycling are almost at a continuous tension. The weight of the body is carried on the saddle, but pedaling makes a demand on muscles not used in walking. Though it relieves the body of the weight of the body, the constant grasp of the hands on the bars brings into use muscles of the back, shoulders, arms, particularly the wrists, that have never before been called upon to do any work. A beginner, hardly possessing a couple of miles of riding and these newly exercised muscles weary of the tension and become sore. The beginner, after with determination, pays no attention to the fact that his opinion is based on nature, but labors on his way as best he can. Perhaps he reaches the turning point of his journey, having neglected to think that it is just as far, perhaps, as he is out. Eventually he reaches home again, (how would he be another story), but the lasting impression that he has of cycling is anything but favorable. The next day and perhaps for two or three days afterwards, his opinion is emphasized by stiff and sore muscles, that make work almost an impossibility and the slightest movement a hardship. A very small proportion of those who have ever undergone an experience such as this persevere, and are profiting by their former errors, try a spin of a mile or two and then take a good rest. Another short run and they are done for. The next day the lengthen their ride perhaps a mile, and at the end of a week are surprised to find that a ride of ten miles is much easier accomplished than the first half mile. They have not become stronger in this one week, but have learned to sit the chair easily, to grasp the bars lightly, to relax the muscles generally, and in every way use them to the best advantage, instead of having them at the utmost tension as they had at the start.
