

### RE NICARAGUA CANAL

Amendment to Hay-Fauncefote Treaty Passed by United States Senate-British Press Comment.

Washington, Dec. 14.-Yesterday the senate, in executive session, took a vote on the amendment to the Hay-Pauncefote treaty authorizing the United States to defend its interests in the caral. The vote was 65 in favor of the amendment and 17 against it. BRITISH COMMENT.

London, Dec. 14 .- Regarding the action taken by the United States Senate, the St. James' Gazette takes occasion to lecture the "jingo senate," which, it says, "has again roughly rebuffed the president and affronted the generosity of Great Britain." It further declares that the action of the senate in "ordering that one party shall keep its advantages with, that the other shall not be safeguarded, is impudent, and if it persists in its ignorantly selfish course Great Britain must fall back on her rights under the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, whereby she is entitled to refuse permission to the

United States to build the canal." The Pall Mall Gazette says: "British consent to the amendment is impossible. Everything for nothing is not a working principle.

Affects London.

Commencing Dec. 16. the Grand Trunk will make a slight revision of the time-table of the above train. Winter travel is naturally much smaller than summer, and fast trains justified during the latter period are usually withdrawn in the former. ### Cleaning the Sidewalks.

MR. WRIGHT'S SUGGESTION.

To the Editor of the Advertiser: In a recent issue I notice nearly all men are in favor of the snowplow if it is efficient. All agree it is not at present. It appears above the ability of the engineering staff employed by the city to improve upon the old plow in use now, which simply piles some of the snow on either side, leaving a trench of snow, which fills with slush when the banks of snow melt on each side. The same banks of snow prevent the slush from running off. again, the snow on one side is thrown against doors, gates or entrances to cause further annoyance. The plow, I suggest, will remedy all this, is inexpensive and effective. It is a single oob, a little higher than an ordinary bob, with a scraper similar to the road-graders, but more concave on top to compel the snow to fall back, the scraper to work in two grooves at each end, resting on coil springs to raise the scraper a sufficient height from the groove. When in use, the scraper is to be kept close to the ground by a hand lever, one groove to be in front of the bob on left side, the other at the end of the bob on right side, which position will cause all the snow to be thrown in the street or on boulevards. A flange of vulcanized rubber might be adjusted behind the scraper for the cement walks, and cause them to be perfectly dry a few minutes after the scraper passed. This would also be useful in summer to clean the asphalt. If a seat is fixed to the bob one man and horse could manage this plow with ease and dispatch. Of course in summer four small castors would have to be fixed to the runners. Hoping this suggestion may be useful, I am yours
