ARE BUILT TOO HIGH.

Is the Complaint Made by Several Interested Ratepayers.

Contracts Awarded for the Construction of Sewers on William and Peter Streets—New Flag-Pole Will Be Placed on the City Hall.

At last night's session of the board of works the most important business transacted was the awarding of small contracts for two new sewers. Unduly high cement sidewalks were provocative of two separate complaints from interested ratepayers, through their legal representatives. The session lasted less than an hour. Those present were Ald. Winnett (chairman), Olmsted, Campbell and Parnell, Mayor Rumball, Engineer Graydon and Secretary Bell.

Tenders were opened and contracts awarded for two sewers, one on Peter street, for its entire length, from Queen's avenue to Dufferin, and the other on William street, between King and Dundas streets. The former was awarded to John Lang, the figure being \$202 and 23 cents per foot for side drains. The latter went to Harding & Easthouse, \$28 and 22 cents per foot for side drains.

One tender was ruled out without opening because the tenderer had refused to fill out the prescribed form, but tendered on a plain sheet of paper. He also neglected to have his tender in within the specified time.

Fraser & Moore wrote on behalf of residents on Wellington street, between Cheapside and Victoria streets, complaining that the new cement walk on the east side is built too high, and that the city will be held responsible for any damage to property. The engineer will report.

Wm. Boies, represented both in person and by Mr. McEvey, complained that his property has been damaged by the raising of the sidewalk at Talbot street and Ann, and he wished the committee to remedy this grievance. In discussing the matter, Ald. Parnell vigorously defended Mr. Boies' attitude and said that the sidewalk in question, as well as others in the city, were absurdly and unnecessarily high. The committee will inspect the spot and make a proposition to Mr. Boies.

The reference back from council of the committee's recommendation to pay the contractor for the Queen's avenue tar macadam pavement, as ordered till next meeting. The committee will meet the ratepayers interested on Saturday.

The committee's recommendation for the appointment of park overseers, referred back from council, was laid over.

Isaac Nixon, et al., ratepayers on Dufferin avenue, between Adelaide

and Elizabeth streets, petitioned that the road be graveled and graded. A deputation was present in support of the petition. The committee will inspect the road.

A Brantford firm will erect a 50-foot iron flagpole on the city hall for \$65. The matter had been left in the hands of the chairman and engineer with power, and they ordered the work done.

WILL URGE ROYALTY TO COME HERE.

Rumor Says That Royal Tour May Not Include London.

C. S. Hymen, M.P., and Sir John Carling Act Promptly to Insure Coveted Visit.

Citizens' Reception Committee Will Second Their Efforts and Arrange for Magnificent Demonstration of Welcome.

The committee of citizens appointed to arrange for a suitable reception to the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, should their royal highnesses visit this city, met last night at the city hall.

The tenor of the royal visit is an event which would dwell long in the memory. Though a disquieting rumor is abroad that the Duke and Duchess may not visit Western Ontario, the committee are sanguine that such will not prove the case, and the citizens of Middlesex and the west will have the opportunity of honoring the future rulers of the British Empire.

Such prominent citizens as Charles J. Hymen, M.P., and Sir John Carling have already shown their readiness to throw the weight of their influence and efforts into the endeavor to insure for this city a visit from the royal party, and if London is left out of the favored list, it will not be for want of whole-hearted effort on the part of those and other leading residents of the city.

If the hoped-for event does come to pass, the scenes of the visit of the Prince of Wales in 1869 will be again enacted. Britain's glorious crown, which will drive home the truth that this section of Ontario, in common with all Canada, is loyal to the core.
