A NOVEL PLEA FOR RUDOWITZ

Speeches for Russ Refugee Made Between Acts of a Drama.

Chicago, Dec. 17. — The cause of Christian Rudowitz, the Russian refugee, whose return to Russia in response to the request of the Russian Government is to be passed upon by the authorities, was pleaded in a novel manner yesterday in the Chicago Opera House.

Upwards of 200 preachers and several hundred settlement workers and members of university faculties attended a special presentation of Israel Zangwill's play, "The Melting Pot." Between the acts there was a curtain speech by Walker Whiteside, who enacted the role of David Quisano, and Jenkin Lloyd Jones, pastor of All Souls' Church, spoke from a box.

The matinee was strictly by invitation, no seats being sold. Although the play dealt with the persecution of Jews in Russia, Rudowitz is a Lutheran from the north of Russia. Nevertheless the teaching of the play is universal religious tolerance.

The audience were Catholic priests, Protestant ministers, Greek Catholics and negro ministers. A delegation of 35 was present from Chicago Commons and James Addams headed a large delegation from Hull House.

Pleds for the Immigrants. Following the third act Jenkin Lloyd Jones stood up in the lower left box and addressed the audience: "When asked on behalf of friends of liberty to put in a sentiment in defence of that hospitality which makes America American, I did not dare refuse," he said, "As an immigrant child I came to this country on an immigrant ship and landed at Castle Garden. I followed the flag of this liberty-loving country."

"We should stand as one man in the interests of that hospitality which makes America the asylum of the oppressed of our earth," Crude Russ asks that we return one who has fought in the high and holy light of revolution. That Government asks opportunity to oppress that man caught in the mangle of an inspiring revolution."

"Our flag must not be dropped in humiliation. Let the Government at Washington see its duty clearly in this particular case."

Actor Whiteside is Cheered. Mr. Whiteside evoked repeated cheering when he responded to demands for a curtain speech. "I had been told that the American people would not accept a message when hurried over the footlights in the guise of drama," said the actor, maintaining his character of the persecuted Jewish musician. CHARGE SWINDLE TO ENGLISH SOLO

Horatio Bottomley, Member of Parliament, Conducts Own Case in Court.

London, Dec. 6. — There opened this week before the Guildhall police court, where Whittaker Wright appeared when brought back from New York, another case which is attracting the public attention of England to almost an equal degree as did the prosecution that ended so dramatically with Wright's suicide.

In the present instance the chief defendant is Horatio Bottomley. Between Whittaker Wright and Horatio Bottomley there is a single line relating to the divorce question which was criticised by President Roosevelt as giving an unfair impression. He took out the line not in deference to President Roosevelt or the American people, but in deference to truth."

Has Multitude of Admirers. For that, in brief, is the meaning of the charges made by the treasury when stripped of their legal phrasology. Wright swindled Bottomley on a petty scale. Wright's deals were vast financial operations with millions at stake, and while many who suffered when the films edifice he built up came to grief were deserving of compassion, he sought his victims in the market place where the unsophisticated are not usually found. In the case of Bottomley it is charged that he went out into the highways and the byways to gather guests for his financial feast.

Bottomley has a multitude of admirers, from the bottom of my heart he would be able to disprove the allegations made against him. I am not ashamed to say I wrote him yesterday and expressed that hope on paper. I'm sure Mr. Wertheimer, prospective Unionist candidate for South Hackney, who Bottomley at present represents in parliament, sitting on the Liberal side, "would rather fight a lion than a man put out by some unfortunate disgrace."

Whereas there again was tremendous cheering.

Wins Friends by Magnetism. How clever a man he is Bottomley has proved, among other ways, by his career in parliament. Despite the serious handicap due to objections entertained by the majority of the members, both to the man and his methods, he has impressed his personality upon the House in a remarkable fashion.

One member of parliament who distrusts him both as a politician and a financier tells a curious story. "I went to one of Bottomley's meetings," he said, "with a friend, but had been induced to take shares in one of his companies. I went persuaded that it was bad business and wanted to back my friend up in opposition to certain proposals Bottomley was going to make. There was a strong party opposition present, but Bottomley had not been speaking fifteen minutes before it melted away like ice in the sun, and I regret to say I myself was won by the magnetism of the speaker. I told my friend perhaps Bottomley was right after all. Similarly in the House of Commons I almost have been persuaded to vote contrary to my convictions after hearing Bottomley speak."

Now, we cannot all attend the council, but I think it is no more than right we should know a little about the business done at our council meetings through the press.

A RATEPAYER.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: In reading over the papers lately, I noticed quite a few letters written by the clergymen of Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto against the introduction of Sunday cars. I take it, these letters were written in order to influence some of our citizens, so as to get a large vote against Sunday cars here. These letters speak of the desecration of these cities, Montreal especially, of the Sabbath. Well, sir, I know very little about Ottawa or Toronto, but I must say, if the population of these cities desecrate the Sabbath as badly as we are led to believe they do, they must be a very bad lot.

However, I do not think it fair to the citizens of London, to compare the cities mentioned with us, nor to say how bad they would be if the cars were running on Sundays, for London, Ontario, is noted for being quite the opposite, and we would not desecrate the Sabbath—cars or no cars. Take the summer months on Sundays. Are not our parks crowded in the afternoon, besides Spadina and the cemeteries? Has it ever been known that the people desecrate the Sabbath while they walk or drive to these places? And with all this, are not all our Sabbath schools filled? Then where does the desecration come in? I fail to see it.

I would like to ask those who oppose Sunday cars to act as if they were in earnest in this matter. Here in this city we have some ten or twelve livery stables, employing some six or eight men each, say seventy-five all Sunday, to hire buggies for pleasure driving, not alone for churches and funerals. Is this the desecration of the Sabbath, or is it not? If it is, why don't these very saintly people put a stop to it? When they do that, I will vote against Sunday street cars. If you are in favor of allowing the one, why not the other?

Now again, with regard to Montreal. Do you know how long the Sabbath lasts? Just till twelve o'clock noon, that is all; when all the theatres, baseball and other sports begin; while in London our Sabbath ends at midnight. Do you see the point? Here we have a splendid police force, who will very soon put a stop to any violation of the Sabbath here. Besides, our city council has the power to frame a bylaw that will protect this from all kinds of secular bands playing music to draw a crowd, save the Salvation Army only.

But, to make a long story short, are we afraid that some of our larger city churches will have to be enlarged, while some others might have to be closed up? Let us try Sunday street cars for one
