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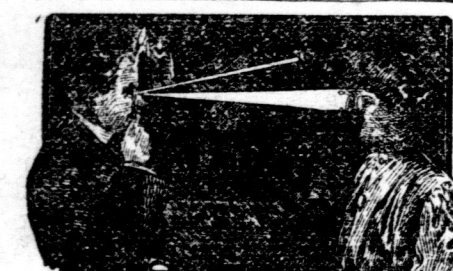
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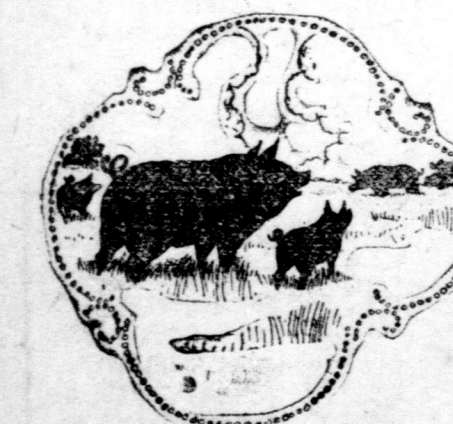

the bereaved husband. The deceased is survived by her husband, father and mother, a sister and three brothers. The funeral, which will be private, takes place tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock to the Aylmer Cemetery.

Grateful to Dr. Williams.
Mr. Albert Hughes, the young man who it was feared for a time would lose both hands as the result of an accident he met with while working for a farmer west of the city, is slowly recovering at the Convalescent Home. It was found necessary to amputate one hand, but it is thought he will shortly have fairly good use of the other. To Dr. Hadley Williams he gives all the credit for this fact, the doctor having or a prospect of financial reward. Mr. Hughes has been granted \$60 by the county council, and when he is able to leave the Convalescent Home, he will buy a stock of goods and make his living at peddling.

Shrove Tuesday.
Yesterday was Shrove Tuesday, the last day before Lent. It is so called from the custom of going to confession to be forgiven on this day before the oncoming of Lent. It is also called Pancake Tuesday from the custom of eating pancakes or fritters. The origin

of this custom is obscure. Some authorities hold that the pancake was one of the dishes of the last of the feasting before the great fast began, a part of the Fat Tuesday or Mardi Gras, which is marked in many places with carnivals and feasting. According to this theory pancakes were forbidden during Lent because they contained eggs, the use of which was formerly forbidden during that season. Another and more commonly accepted explanation is that pancakes were meager fare and were allowed those who went to confession.

Janitors' Salaries Given a Boost By the Local Board of Education

Routine Business Also Transacted at the Meeting Held Yesterday.

Considerable business was transacted by the board of education at its meeting yesterday afternoon, when a number of reports were received and disposed of.

Chairman MacRobert, of No. 1 committee, in his report, recommended that plans for an addition to Lorne avenue school be procured as soon as possible from Architect Nutter.

The report also included a recommendation that steps be taken to obtain better light in rooms 2, 5 and 11 of Simcoe street school.

Progress was reported in the matter of better sanitary arrangements for Talbot street school.

Janitors' Salaries.
The question of janitors' salaries was finally disposed of by giving all janitors who have charge of schools with less than four rooms \$45 per month per annum, and all having charge of schools with more than four rooms \$60 per month per annum, with the express understanding that they do all the work of oiling the floors and shoveling the snow, and that on no account are any extras to be allowed.

This will be embodied in the board of education regulations of the future. The increases will mean about \$75 a year to each janitor.

It was decided that in future the salary of Janitor J. C. Martin, of the Collegiate Institute, be \$1,000 a year, and that of Mr. J. Drew \$750.

Mr. John Clements, general repairer, will draw \$900 in the future.

Number Two Committee's Report.
Chairman Westervelt, of No. 2 committee, recommended that Principal McCutcheon's recommendation in regard to teachers for the schools, be adopted. Carried.

It was decided to expend \$200 for pictures in the various city schools.

Vice-Principal R. A. Little, of the Collegiate, will in future take charge of the upper assembly.

Chairman Granger, of No. 3 committee, read a request from Miss Veda Collins, Inspector Edwards' assistant, asking for an increase of salary. It was decided to pay her \$6 a week instead of \$5, as formerly.

The Relieving Principal.
Chairman MacRobert stated that Mr. Kelly, the relieving principal, was not satisfied with his salary, and recommended that he be placed on the \$1,300 to \$1,500 a year basis, on condition that he be required to do work in connection with the high school examinations that has been done by Mr. Gibbs.

Trustee Teasdale opposed the move.

DEATH OF FORMER LONDON MANAGER

Mr. James Hogg, in Montreal—A Well-Known Bank Man.

Mr. James Hogg, formerly manager of the Bank of Montreal, in this city, and one of the best known bank managers in Canada, died in Montreal yesterday after a very short illness.

Mr. Hogg was 74 years old and had been in excellent health. Recently he left to visit friends in Montreal, and while there was taken with an illness from which he died.

Mr. Hogg was a native of Scotland and came to this country when a very young man.

Entering the banking business he was most successful and held many prominent positions throughout the country.

He came to this city from Winnipeg and, until 1892, when he was pensioned, was manager of the branch here.

His wife, two sons, Dr. D. Hutchison Hogg, of this city, and William, manager of the Bank of Montreal in Calgary, and two daughters at home, survive.

The remains arrived from Montreal this morning. The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.
