During the battle, in which dynamite was employed, two policemen Bonnot died fighting to the last, but Dubois poisoned himself after the police and soldiers had made a breach in the wall. Chief Guichard has been on the trail of the bandits for several days, and this morning he and several detectives arrived at the village of Choisy-le-Roi, five miles from the fortifications, in the same direction as Ivry. This was the scene of the fight with the chief last Wednesday, when Sub-Chief Jouin was killed.

THIRTY BODIES BURIED AT SEA

One Hundred and Eighty-Nine Identified Dead Are on the Mackay-Bennett.

Ninety-Seven Completes the List of the Identified Bodies.

New York, April 27 .- Ninenty-seven additional names of the dead who lost down were received at the White Star offices Saturday and today from the cable ship Mackay-Bennett. The message says that the 97 "completes the list of identified bodies." As the Mackay-Bennett already had reported that she would make-Halifax with 189 of the 219 bodies picked up by this boat, the assumption is that her skipper was compelled to bury 30 at sea. Up to the time of receiving the lists of additional bodies identified, 91 of the 189 bodies which are expected to reach Halifax tomorrow had been identified, thus leaving one body unaccounted for.
