TWELVE NURSES GET DIPLOMAS AT ST. PETER'S HALL

Miss Aline Hargitt Delivers Valedictory—A Brilliant Graduation Scene.

Mayor Graham Presents the Medals—Bishop Fallon and Others Speak.

St. Peter's Parish Hall was crowded to the doors on Tuesday night, when friends and acquaintances of the graduating class of St. Joseph's Hospital were present to hear the valedictory address, and to see the twelve pretty nurses receive their diplomas from the hand of His Lordship Bishop Fallon before entering upon their individual careers as soothsayers of suffering, and as the twelve nurses, who were entrusted to their care, were seated on all sides as the curtain rose upon a stage massed with flowers and the graduates filed slowly in, each wearing her nurse's garb and bearing a sheaf of roses.

The Valedictory. Miss Aline Hargitt made the valedictory address, welcoming those present on behalf of the Sisters of St. Joseph's and the 13 class at St. Joseph's. They felt they had trained in one of the best hospitals in the country. The time had passed rapidly, and though their profession demanded hard work and much self-sacrifice, they entered into it joyfully, feeling that in some degree they were following the footsteps of Him who "went about doing good."

Bishop Fallon's Address. Bishop Fallon, in a brief address, urged the nurses to have a regard for the spiritual welfare of the patients entrusted to their care. "I know, of course, that your main duty is to minister to the ills of the body," said his lordship, "but there comes a time in the life of every patient, when medical skill and nursing no matter how attentive, become helpless. You young ladies, while attending to your nurse's duties, and while holding various beliefs, need not interfere in any way with those of your patients, yet cast so much towards making the person in your charge look with more hope and courage and confidence to the voyage across the ocean that separates time from eternity."

A High Motive. Dr. Morgan exhorted the members of the class to enter their profession from a high motive, to be loyal to their physician, and to give him the best of their service.

Col. Garthshore Speaks. Col. Garthshore of the Victoria Hospital Board, also spoke briefly, congratulating the graduates upon their success, and expressing his best wishes for their work in the future.

Following the exercises a most enjoyable dance was given, the Cortese Orchestra rendering music for the occasion.

Many Measles Cases Are Not Reported

Dr. Hutchinson, medical officer of health, does not believe that all the cases of measles in the city are being reported. A dozen new cases were reported Monday from one of the city schools. It is believed that there are at present one or two hundred cases in the city, although the outbreak is dying down.

The measles are not a very serious disease, and probably in the majority of cases they are treated with home remedies without calling a physician. The city doctors are reporting all the cases they come in contact with, but Dr. Hutchinson believes that these are only a small proportion of the total number.

The estimates for 1913 will be the chief subject of discussion at the meeting of the board of health this afternoon.

A Voluntary "Lister."—One more addition was made to the prohibitory case of a man who asked to be put on the list in the hope that it would enable him to keep away from the whiskey. The magistrate commended him on his laudable desire to do better. Several others who had meddled with the flowing bowl, were allowed to depart with the customary injunction not to return.
