

Swedes Protest German Inhumanity

Send Expression of Feeling for Distribution in United States.

[Canadian Press.] Stockholm, May 15.—A group of prominent Swedes have requested the press to distribute in America the following expression of their sentiments concerning what they call "inhuman methods of warfare."

The Swedish people are virtually unanimous in supporting the Government in its policy of strict neutrality, yet a large section of them, whether a majority or not we cannot say, are anything but neutral in their feelings over the methods of warfare adopted in this terrible war, which culminated in the sinking of the steamship Lusitania.

"The misconception that war suspends all the laws of humanity must prove fatal to the future of civilization and disastrous to that human solidarity which is of such vital importance, particularly to the smaller nations of the world."

33RD BATTALION MEN RIFLE ON SHOULDER PARADE THE STREETS

Led by Bugle Band, Khaki-Clad Hundreds Make Fine Showing.

With heads held high and a truly martial step, nearly 1,200 men of the 33rd Battalion swung through the streets last night in time with the tattoo of drums and the cadence of bugle notes. Stepped out smartly, not alone because hundreds of citizens lining the curbs, watching in admiration the regular columns of swinging khaki, applauded vociferously, but because long months of training in sun and storm had made them men equal to the pride of London—"The Fighting 38th"—now overseas in the trenches.

Londoners who were downtown last night when the 33rd swung by stopped and gazed—then turned with words of praise on lips for the splendid fellows who, with never a glance to right or left, and with hands on rifles in a business-like manner, marched so sprightly, although many miles of city pavements and country roads had been left behind as the brown ranks moved forward.

The battalion left the concentration camp at the fair grounds shortly after 7 o'clock and proceeded west on Dundas to Richmond. At the corner they wheeled, clearing, and led by the bugle band, swung northward, out past the city limits. Strategical manoeuvres were engaged in during the evening at Carling's Heights, following the route march.

RUSSIANS FORCING AUSTRIANS BACK

Latter Give Up Strong Position Ninety-Four Miles Long.

Gives Up a Strong Position Ninety-Four Miles in Length.

RETREATING IN DISORDER

Muscovites Forming a New Line Occupying a Shorter Front.

[Canadian Press.] Petrograd (via London), May 14.—9:55 p.m.—The following official communication was issued this evening:

"In the region of Shavli the fighting is developing under conditions favorable to us. Yesterday we took more than one thousand German prisoners and captured nine machine guns.

"Our troops are concentrating gradually on the line of the River San, which was sacrificed in repeated charges to protect the general retreat, was dispersed by our fire.

"Our cavalry divisions broke through the enemy's front at various points, and, by successful charges, threw the enemy's columns, which were on the march, into disorder.

"Our vigorous pursuit of the enemy continues under conditions particularly favorable to us. The great number of prisoners we already have taken is being rapidly increased."

GERMAN REPORTS ARE PURE FAKES.

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 14.—The military attaché of the Russian embassy has received the following dispatch from his government:

"The Russian general staff, in a statement issued May 12, says that last week the German military authorities made erroneous statements about operations on the Russian front.

"Thus they said that the Germans took two guns during the battle at Libau, whereas the Russian artillery detachment operating there had but four guns. At Rostenie the Germans not only did not cause the Russians heavy losses, but had no success at all. The Russians were not in full retreat, as the German communiques say, but their forces were obliged to withdraw along the front of the Russian offensive for a distance of from six to thirty miles.

"The Germans affirm that they have driven back the Russian attacks at Kalwary, Augustowo, and Przanyski, and inflicted great losses on the Russians, but the Russians made no attack there. The Germans attacked the Russian forces at Vaskindio, Rajets and at the farm Ponikany, but some of their attacks were only demonstrations and the others were for the purpose of reconnoitering the necessary points they had lost previously.

"In Galicia after the abortive German attempt to surround the 4th Division of the Russian army the action during the last nine days has taken the character of frontal attacks against the Russian fortified positions, which have been successfully repulsed by the Russians. It is true that the Russian losses are very heavy, but it is true, also, that the losses of the German-Austrian army are enormous. Nothing to boom their success the Germans multiplied by many times the number of the Russian prisoners taken by them, a great part of whom were wounded, as the Russian troops, gradually retreating, had no means of taking them from the field of battle.

"The boom about the great victory in Galicia seems to be intended to lead the spirits in Germany and to restrain the German step she is now about to take."

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

THE LOCAL MARKET

A large Saturday market had vegetable as its feature. Radishes sold at two bunches for 5 cents; rhubarb and lettuce have reduced to the same figure, or 20 cents per dozen bunches; asparagus sells for 50 cents per dozen, or two bunches for 15 cents. Potatoes are plentiful though they were a week ago. The price remains unchanged. Apples are still selling at a fair demand. Peaches are still selling at a fair demand. Eggs today declined slightly in the wholesale price, selling by the crate for 19 cents per dozen. The retail price kept up to 22 cents per dozen. Butter was fairly steady, although there was a weaker tone to the market. The supply was not quite large enough to cheapen the price.

Oats were lower, selling at from \$1.90 to \$1.94 per cwt. Wheat remains at \$1.40 per bushel. The supply is very small.

Dressed hogs are slow on the local market at present, but the slackness in buying will not likely be sufficient to make much difference in prices. Pork is sold today for \$11.75 per cwt. Live hogs are quoted at \$8.60 per cwt. Several loads of live fowl and young chickens were sold at quoted prices.
