THE FUGITIVE. By Rabindranath pany, publishers, Toronto.

THE verse in this collection of poems and one-act dramas assuredly justifies its existence by virtue of exquisite phrasing and beauty of imagery. But it also possesses that charm, so often found in oriental writings, of a twofold significance. It is earthly experience translated into song; but it is also spirit ual prevision.

Thus the Platonic figure of a charlot drawn by one steed of the heavens and one of the earth again proves its verisimilitude.

The plays are all as tragic as King Lear. But there is always at least one great soul which affirms its power when hope is dead. The immortal tale "of love and of death and of honor that cannot die" is fitingly told and retold in these brief

dramas. It has been as wisely as generously said that every man is entitled o be valued by his best moments Tagore, like most other genius, has his moments of folly, of intemperateness, even of unfairness.
