### ALL ALLIES IN HARMONY

London, Nov. 9 .- (By Canadian Press.)-Speaking at the annual lord mayor's banquet at the Guildhall tonight, Prime Minister Bonar Law dealt with the foreign policy of his government, and laid special emphasis on the fact that British foreign policy must have the support of the dominions throughout the emdominions throughout the empire.

"The fact is," said the prime minister, "that in the war the great dominions sprang into manhood in their relations to the Mother Country and there were changes in that hour. They will never be the same again. As Lord Curzon said yesterday, in all our policy we have to think not only of public opinion at home, but have to use every means in our power to make certain that we have the sunport of public opinion throughout the empire

"I think also it is no disadvantage -not to put it any higher-that just at the time when those dominions have reached manhood a man born in one of them should be prime minister.

Allies in Harmony. Referring to conditions in the Near East, Mr. Bonar Law said: "You know what the position is at the moment in Constantinople. I cannot tell you anything new, except this: that so far all the allies have acted as we are acting, with the most com-plete harmony and without ani-mosity. I say this also, as I have every reason not only to hope, but to that if this continues the difficulty will be overcome.
