BRITISH DESIRE  
TO CANCEL DEBT

**Would Wipe Out Obligations  
Owed To Her by  
France.**

Offer Reduction of German  
Indemnity As Reparation  
Solution.

PARIS, July 17.—The reduction of  
the German indemnity to 50,000,000-  
000 gold marks from the present to-  
tal of 132,000,000,000, and the cancel-  
lation of the French debt to Great  
Britain is the basis of a solution of  
the reparations question now being  
seriously discussed by French and  
British officials.  
Although the scheme has not yet  
officially reached the reparations  
commission, members of the latter  
have discussed the details. It is ex-  
pected the proposed plan will be one  
of the chief subjects of discussion in  
the forthcoming meeting of Premiers  
Poincare and Lloyd George.  
The suggested solution has the  
hearty support of British officials  
who have been urging its acceptance  
upon the French officials. It is an-  
nounced. The latter, so the Associ-  
ated Press has been reliably in-  
formed, is looking with more and more  
favor upon the plan, provided it car-  
ries with it a clean-cut pledge of as-  
sistance in time of attack and as-  
sures France the allotment, wholly,  
or in part, of Great Britain's 22 per  
cent share of the total indemnity.  
It is believed that Great Britain is  
ready to concede virtually all these  
demands if full acceptance on the  
part of the French government is  
obtained.  
The British decided to push the  
plan when it was definitely deter-  
mined that the United States was  
not in the mood to discuss cancel-  
lation of the allied debt. It was  
learned today. The proposal has  
strong advocates in the reparations  
commission. It is expected in that  
quarter that it would have the un-  
official support of the American gov-  
ernment.  
The plan would call for a mora-  
torium for the remainder of this  
year's cash payments, the Associated  
Press learns, experts taking the view  
that Germany would probably be able  
to balance her budget by January,  
provided she is relieved of payments  
until that time.

FIND SKELETON  
OF MISSING MAN

WINNIPEG, July 17.—The skele-  
ton of John Collins, a Belgian farm-  
hand, who disappeared under mys-  
terious circumstances from High  
Buff Farm last January, was found  
yesterday afternoon on the outskirts  
of this city with a revolver bullet  
lying under the neck. The bullet  
probably had become imbedded in the  
flesh and fell out when the flesh be-  
came decayed. Collins came here to  
transact some legal business, and  
never was seen again. There is strong  
suspicion that the man was murder-  
ed.

HOLD FUNERAL OF  
MITCHELL CITIZEN

**Special to London Advertiser.**  
MITCHELL, July 17.—The remains  
of the late Mary King, who died in  
Detroit on Friday, July 14, arrived  
in Mitchell on Monday morning, and  
the funeral took place to the St.  
Vincent de Paul Church, where re-  
quiem mass was sung by the pastor,  
Rev. Father Kelly.  
The late Miss King, who was born  
in Mitchell, during the greater part  
of her life had been a member and  
active worker in the Mitchell Roman  
Catholic Church. Interment took  
place in the family plot at the rear  
of the church.

Believed Marriage in  
Presbyterian Church  
Was Void.

OTTAWA, July 17.—(By Can-  
adian Press.)—Because no  
banns were published in a  
Roman Catholic church, Wil-  
liam George Woods of Bourget  
thought he could wed again  
after he had parted from his  
first spouse, to whom he was  
wed in a Presbyterian edifice,  
according to his defense on a  
charge of bigamy which has been  
laid against him to be heard at  
Rockland tomorrow.  
As proof of his sincerity, ac-  
cused is producing an an-  
nouncement of his second mar-  
riage in a French newspaper.  
Friends told Woods, he says,  
as he and his first wife were  
Catholics, the marriage in a  
Presbyterian church was void.

RUN OVER BY CAR,  
MAY LOSE LEGS

WINDSOR, July 17.—Louis Car-  
naghie, 55 years old, 912 Lillian ave-  
nue, Windsor, may lose both his legs  
as a result of having been run over  
by a street car on Wyandotte street,  
near Parent avenue, at 9:15 a.m.,  
today.

Carnaghie was riding to work  
when the front wheel of his bicycle  
skidded on the tracks, throwing him  
beneath the wheels of a street car.  
Before the car had been stopped  
both front and rear wheels had  
passed over his legs.  
He was taken to the Hotel Dieu.  
Physicians there said his condition  
was serious.

QUEBEC EXPECTS RECORD  
FOR REVENUE THIS YEAR

MONTREAL, July 17.—A revenue  
which will exceed by a wide margin  
any in the history of the Province  
of Quebec, will shortly be announced  
officially by Hon. Jacob Nicol, pro-  
vincial treasurer.  
Mr. Nicol, who was in the city to-  
day, was not prepared to give exact  
figures, but intimated that all previous  
records would be broken.  
Receipts for the year to June 30,  
1921, were \$15,914,521.17, the record  
to that date, but \$4,000,000 from the  
liquor revenue for the current year  
will help swell last year's figures.

**THE GOVERNOR'S ROAD**, east of

with concrete as a provincial high-  
way for several miles, was opened for  
traffic Saturday. Completion of this  
section of pavement eliminates a de-  
tour for motorists which has been

pants thrown out on the sidewalk as  
the rig tipped over. They escaped  
with a few bruises and a bad shaking  
up. The result may entail a suit for  
damage.

REFUSE EMMA GOLDMAN  
ADMITTANCE TO ENGLAND

LONDON, July 17.—Premier Lloyd  
George, in answer to a question in  
the House of Commons, said that  
the British government was steadily

pursuing a policy of insisting that  
Germany adopt the financial reforms  
recommended by the reparations  
commission. He said that the first  
essential was the re-establishment of  
the German financial system and the  
restoration of the equilibrium in the  
budget.  
In reply to a question directed at  
Home Secretary Shortt, the latter  
stated that Emma Goldman would  
not be allowed to enter England, as  
her presence was considered unde-  
sirable.

given an adverse decision to the con-  
tention of the Toronto assessment  
department that for assessment and  
taxation purposes the lieutenant-gov-  
ernor should be regarded as domi-  
ciled in Toronto. The board rules  
that his honor is a permanent resi-  
dent of Brantford, and that his  
private income is derived therefrom  
and consequently he must pay in-  
come tax in that city and not in To-  
ronto.

**GRANT FURLOUGH  
TO MISSIONARIES**

TORONTO, July 17.—Two more  
Presbyterian missionaries, who have  
worked in the foreign field for the  
regular six-year period, were re-  
ported by the Presbyterian Mission  
officers in Toronto to have just re-  
turned to this country on a year's  
furlough.

Miss Emma Palethorpe, who is a  
native of Ingersoll, Ont., left Can-  
ada for the mission field in Korea in  
April of 1916, and arrived back in  
Toronto again today, later proceed-  
ing to her home town. Miss Ger-  
trude Cass, the other missionary,  
also went to the mission field from  
Ontario, her home being in Chesley,  
Ont. She also labored in Korea.
