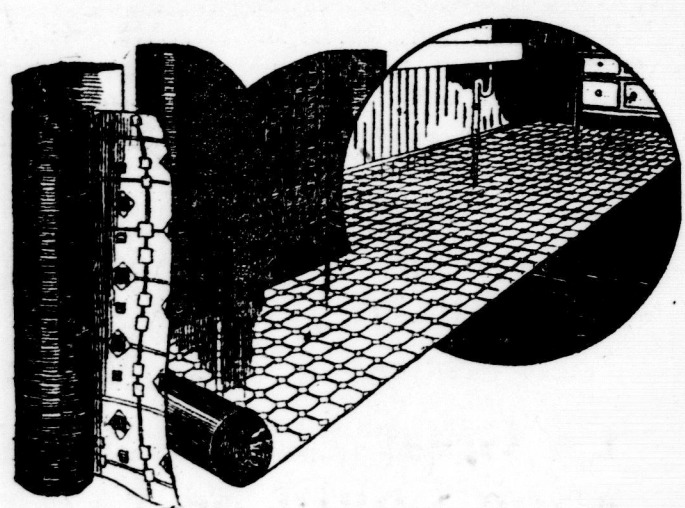

STOP U. S. BANKS SENDING MONEY TO IRISH REBELS

Injunction Signed by Justice Burr On Application of Free Staters.

ORDER TIES UP \$2,300,000

Representatives Contend the Funds To Be Devoted To Further Revolution.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—A temporary injunction restraining local banks in which are deposited moneys collected for the Irish Republican cause from releasing them to Eamon de Valera, or any of his agents, was signed late today by Supreme Court Justice Burr on application of attorneys representing Michael Collins and other officers of the Irish Free State forces.

It was announced that approximately \$2,300,000 was tied up by the order. Service of complaint on de Valera and the other defendants was ordered to be made through the insertion of advertisements in papers in England and Ireland. Most of the funds involved are said to be deposited with the Guaranty Trust Company and the Harriman National Bank.

Reasons For Injunction.

The main contention urged against the de Valera custody of the Irish funds, the application for an injunction read, was that Ireland is now a nation; that de Valera is against the present government, and is a fugitive, and that he is not entitled to the money.

If de Valera or his forces were granted the present funds in United States banks, the Free State representatives contend, it would be devoted to the carrying on of further revolution against the present government and prolong needless and unjustifiable civil war in a country which has expressed by the ballot its preference for the Irish Free State form of government.

It is further stated in the application that the Irish Free State is prepared to make good the bonds of that nation, and that the quickest way to end the present revolt is to deprive de Valera and his aides of funds from this country.

All checks on these funds were deposited in the local banks in de Valera's name up to the time of the signing of the Irish peace treaty, it was said today. The money was placed under the jurisdiction of three trustees—Bishop Fogarty, James O'Mara and de Valera. They, in turn, were responsible to the Daily Eireann.

Deposit \$50,000 Bond.

Opponents of de Valera charged that, in spite of their protests, not less than \$125,000 was withdrawn from the Irish funds in this city during the early part of this year. There was begun some time ago a series of inquiries concerning the exact status of the funds; those who opposed de Valera charged that they could obtain no information from him, and that legal proceedings were thus necessitated.

The firm of attorneys representing the Irish Free State officials today deposited with the county clerk a bond of \$50,000 guaranteeing the good faith of the applicants. The funds involved are represented by \$1,500,000 in securities, and \$800,000 in cash.

Declares Ways of Modern Woman Slowly Creating Race of Bachelors

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Modern woman is driving man into celibacy. This indictment against the women of the "flapper age" was made today by Francis Henry Gribble, critic and novelist, and one of the best-known publicists in Great Britain.

Modern woman, according to Mr. Gribble, is robbed of her mystery, and therefore the desire of man to marry her is lessened.

"There is no question that the mystery in which women used to be wrapped was a romantic asset and a provocative challenge which sometimes led men to propose marriage to women whom they certainly would not have wished to marry if they had known them better," said Mr. Gribble. "Emancipation of women does not merely mean that chaperons have

been discarded as obsolete.

"That, perhaps, was all that it meant at first, but it has gradually come to mean, in many cases, a freedom of manner and a laxity of morals so pronounced, that the clergy of all degrees and denominations have been moved to protest. And that sort of thing, little as the women who laugh at these protests may suspect it, has a distinct bearing upon their prospects of marriage.

"And for an obvious reason. The seriously domesticated man will not have for his wife the type of girl who has made too free with the conventions in her 'desire to live.' She has set tongues wagging by her indiscretions—and no man likes his wife to be the subject of such gossipous recollections."

DR. SUN YAT SEN TO ACCEPT OFFER

Will Assist Wu Pei Fu in Reorganizing Chinese Government.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 21.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, deposed president of South China, who recently fled here from Canton, leaped to the front today as a pivotal figure in the reorganization of the Chinese government with receipt of a telegram from Wu Pei Fu, dominant military figure of North China, endorsing Sun's recent manifesto and pledging his support to Sun's policy for rebuilding the federal government machinery.

Despite the fact that Sun Yat Sen backed Chang Tso Lin, governor of the three eastern provinces, in his late unsuccessful tilt against Wu Pei Fu, the latter's telegram today, addressed to his personal representative here, General Sun Yueh, expresses unqualified indorsement of Sun Yat Sen's policies.

These include the southerner's terms for the convocation and functioning of parliament free from all outside interests, self government for the provinces, to replace the Tschun, or military governorship system, and the conversion of the independent provincial armies into labor battalions to wield the hoe instead of the sword.

PERE MARQUETTE TO REFUND CUTS

President Alfred Announces Canadian Clerks Will Receive Checks Shortly.

WINDSOR, Aug. 21.—Frank H. Alfred, president and general manager of the Pere Marquette Railway, today announced to members of the council sitting here on the pay dispute between the P. M. R. and its clerks, that the clerks would receive back paychecks for the difference in pay between the old rate and the reduced rate, which came into effect July 1.

This action came as a result of a conference with Mr. Alfred, after Charles B. McClurg, St. Thomas barrister, representing the clerks on the board, stated that according to the terms of the industrial disputes act no pay cut could be put into effect before a board of conciliation had rendered a decision on the case.

The pay cut went into effect on the Pere Marquette Railway on July 1. Mr. Alfred, while signifying his complete willingness to comply with the terms of the Canadian act, declared that it was his opinion that the Canadian clerks were getting an unfair advantage over the American employees, who still receive the reduced rate.

FOUND DEAD UNDER SNOW-PLOW IN TORONTO YARDS

John Harrison Believed To Have Been Struck on Head by Lever.

TORONTO, Aug. 21.—John Harrison, aged 38, of 39 McMurray avenue, was killed at the West Toronto P. E. R. freight yards this morning. Harrison, who was a carman, was working under a snowplow with another man. This workman went to the shop to get some material and when he returned he found Harrison dead. There were no witnesses of the accident, but it is believed that when Harrison pulled out the pin on a lever he was fixing, the lever swung back and struck him on the head, instantly killing him. The body was removed to the morgue.

THINKS CANADA CANNOT COMPETE IN MEAT TRADE

BRANDON, Man., Aug. 21.—A profitable business in chilled meat between Canada and Great Britain cannot be established for the simple reason that Canada would be competing with the trade from South America, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, declared J. D. McGregor, known internationally as a cattle dealer, during the course of an address on "The British Embargo" to members of the Kiwanis Club here today.

Mr. McGregor said he had come to this conclusion from personal investigation and that climatic conditions were too big a handicap for Canada to compete in the chilled meat trade.

C. N. R. WILL NOT BE ELECTRIFIED

Management Writes Karl N. Homuth That Financial Conditions Bar Project.

GALT, Aug. 21.—Karl K. Homuth, M.L.A. of Preston, at the last session of the Provincial Legislature, fathered a motion asking that the branch lines of the Canadian National Railways, including the Grand Trunk, be electrified.

He has received a reply from the management of the Canadian National Railways to the effect that financial conditions bar electrification of their lines, and furthermore, lines now operated in Ontario are not at present handling a sufficient volume of business to warrant their electrification. As to the G. T. R. lines, the C. N. R. management professed to be in the dark.

The city may face legal proceedings as a result of not complying with its own bylaw regarding the cutting of noxious weeds.
