Every rink has two games Monday, and at 7:30 the London and Hamilton match lends a touch of variety to the usual program pursued in the past. The Press Press-Touch and Turnbull Trophies are up in the rink competitions, and the new Liberty Trophy in the Scotch doubles, entries for which will be accepted from defeated rinks.

HOSPITALS START CRICKET SERIES

Ontario Hospital Defeats Hamilton in First Match.

On Thursday the Ontario Hospital Cricketers journeyed by car to Hamilton and opened up a new series of cricket matches to be played annually for a cup kindly donated by Drs. English and Robinson, the superintendents of the Ontario Hospitals at Hamilton and London respectively. This year the competition is just between London and Hamilton, home and home matches, two wins entitling a team to cup; in the event of both teams winning one match each, a deciding game to be played on neutral grounds. Next season it is to be an open challenge cup to all Ontario Hospital cricket clubs, to be played for as often as is wished, so some keen interest is sure to be taken in these games. No outside players are permitted in the series, and the playing representing all hospital employees. Play was commenced at 11:30, when Hamilton, winning the toss, elected to bat first, and the whole side was dismissed for a total of 73 runs, a small total considering the record of the club.

On the return to the field after lunch, the locals went into bat at 2 p.m. Runs began to pile up right from the start, and the locals outshone themselves by putting up their highest score since pre-war days, getting for their innings 235 runs, only three of the team failing to reach double figures. Altogether the team batted just 2 hours and 15 minutes.

The Hamiltonians returned to bat at 4:20, but again were slightly worried by the splendid bowling of the visitors, being unable to get into their stride at all, and they were eventually all dismissed for 85 runs. H. Swann, the captain of the Hamiltonians, started in good order, and completed the two innings 54 runs. For the locals J. May was exceedingly good with the ball, getting 13 wickets for a total of 80 runs.
