Interior Is Perfect and Archi-
tecture of New Front Is
Likewise.

PLEASING EFFECT

Children's Department Is
Decorated With Pictures
To Interest Youngsters.

With the completion of an imposing
store front, which architects say is
perfection in display arrangement,
Hubert Ashplant & Sons now occupy
one of the finest retail stores in the
city.

Not long ago the interior of the
building was fitted out with the most
modern equipment for a retail shoe
dealer, and now, with the attractive
display window, in which the final
stages of decoration have just been
completed, Ashplant & Sons possess
a store which ranks with the best
America has to offer.

The architectural designs for the
new display window were drawn up
by John M. Moore. Every detail
which makes for beauty and decorativeness
has been followed out. Now
that the window is completed a great
variety of high quality footwear is
shown to advantage.

Children's Department.
Further renovations were made to
the interior of the store, and an at-
tractive children's department com-
pletes a most pleasing effect.

The masonry and carpentry work,
which is of the highest workmanship,
was carried out by R. G. Wilson &
Sons, and the electric work of instal-
ling a system of fans to take care of
the hot summer months was done by

The steel work, always an impor-
tant factor in the construction of
modern structures, was completed by
the London Bridge Company. The
painting and decorating was per-
formed by Colerick Bros., and the
woodwork and frames by Wm. Gerry
& Son. The London Art Glass and
Mirror Work installed the huge sheets
of plate glass which enclose the front.
The stone work was carried out by
A. & E. Nobbs.

The balcony for the sale of chil-
dren's shoes is situated at the rear of
the first floor and midway between
the first and second floors. In size it
measures 29 by 32 feet. A wide
colonial stairway leads to the depart-
ment.

Walls Decorated.
The walls of the children's depart-
ment are decorated with pictures to
interest the young folk, and off the
balcony a wide stairway leads to the
second floor. This department has
been elaborately fitted for the sale of
leather and trunk goods, and a
spacious window display has been
made at the front.

A unique feature of Hubert Ash-
plant & Sons is the third floor, in
which is installed a modern and
well-equipped shoe repair department,
connected with the main store by a
small dumb waiter and speaking tube
to facilitate service.

On the children's balcony a neat
office has been fitted out for the
cashier. An up-to-date automatic
cash system running to all depart-
ments has been installed from this
balcony.

In order to build the new window
front on Dundas street the old front
had to be removed. The new display
has been built of a pleasing design,
trimmed with Indiana limestone.

In the lower story long span was
used, necessitating steel columns as
the sides and a 30-inch deep steel

girder supporting the superstructure.
Special anchoring of the front wall to
side walls was made in order to
rigidly reinforce the front.

The store front is constructed of
heavy drawn copper, worked up to
an attractive design. This is the only
all-copper front in the city.

The interior of the store front is
finished in old ivory, making a
splendid background for displaying
shoes. The interior of the display is
finished in American quartered oak,
and the outside of the doors in
walnut.

Colors Pleasant.

The whole window has been built
with pleasing color effect, the tile
floor at the entrance to the store
having been selected of buff color, set
with a suitable border of red and
chocolate. The glass at the back of
the store front, including the main
entrance doors, has been set with an
etched design, making the whole front
an harmonious design and arrange-
ment.

At the rear of the first floor, con-
veniently situated to the store itself,
has been placed the main office,
lighted from an overhead light shaft.
The walls have been paneled with
wood stripping, finished in a light buff
with a darker base.

Adjoining the office the shipping
room is situated. Here all goods are
received from the Carling street
entrance, unboxed and distributed to
the various departments of the store.
The heating of the entire building
is by steam, supplied by the Greene-
Swift Company.

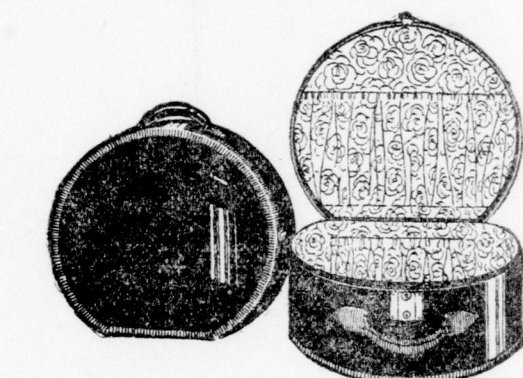
