

Besides the careful management of the Women's Refuge, the Aged People's Home and Home for Lacurables, the association has carried on quietly, a remarkable relief work in the city, throughout the past half of a century. It is recorded that in 1895, Mrs. St. John Hyttenrauch was instrumental, through donations of clothing from her friends, in sending seventeen children to church. This but one of the many instances of plendid work done.

The jail and hospital visiting was an important work of the association in past years. As early as 1898 the members are found agitated over the abuses of the jail system and seeking means to bring about reforms. The women kept in close touch with the prisoners holding services there and providing reading matter. D. S. Perrin is mentioned as a "true friend of the prisoner, who seemed never to weary in well-doing."





During the year following its opening, the patients at the home grew from two to sixteen. And it was not long before the association had to begin to look out for larger quarters. These they found on Dundas street, just east of Adelaide street, and until but a few years ago this building bore the name of "Victoria Home for Incurables." By 1900 an addition had been added to the home, which would then accommodate fifty patients, and in 1915 the "annex," directly east of the home, was purchased to meet the growing needs of the institution. For years Mrs. Groshaw figured prominently in the history of the nome as its matron.

The patients were transferred to the present beautiful home on Grand avenue but a few years ago. modern institution, with its bright cheery wards and lovely surroundings, will accommodate seventy-two patients, and it is filled to the last
