Leslie Hatheway, former bank clerk and London automobile salesman, arrested in Toronto last night on a charge of robbing the Bank of Mentreal branch at Thorndale on the afternoon of July 3, will arrive in London tonight, accompanied by Provincial Constable A. Lloyd Mennie, who is almost entirely responsible for the apprehension of the youthful and daring bank bandit.

Hatheway was remanded in Toronto police court this morning until such time as Constable Mennie was prepared to take him to London. Immediately on the prisoner's arrival, he will be rushed to the county jail and placed in the famous steel cage built specially for Sid. Murrell. Hatheway, who will appear before Deputy Magistrate Gladman, will be further remanded and likely come before the court tomorrow morning. SMART POLICE WORK

Hatheway's capture resulted from smart police work on the part of Constable Mennie and those closely associated with him.
