### HEREDITY.

The passion of this continent for changing things as they are in sport, seemingly so overworked lately, is not new. Trotting and pacing gaits in harness horse racnig are artificial. It is not generally realized that the pacing gait of a horse for speed is running, and that pacing and trotting gaits were developed very slowly. However, the remarkable thing is that heredity has developed to such a point that young trotters and pacers are born in these days, not made and trained, as they were in the beginning. With each stage of development has come more speed, not great bursts, but a sure paring off of fractional sec-Twenty years ago, a horse capable of trotting a final quarter in 30 secnods was regarded as a phenomenon. Last week at Columbus. Aileen Guy did the last quarter in 2814. That achievement is the result of split seconds of development over a period of perhaps 30 or 40 years, and has been aided, it might be added, by lighter sulkies, better shoeing, better driving, and all the accumulated knowledge gained of better methods of conditioning.

Three seconds progress for all those years of concentration on breeding and training do not seem much at first glance in the way of accomplishment. As a matter of fact, it's really under two seconds if consistent performances were reckoned, for the records that mark the steady cutting down of fractions of seconds were made when the day, the track and the horse were just right, and there was a little luck thrown in as well.
