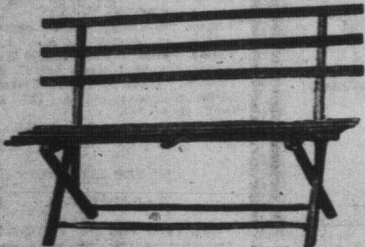

RANGERS LOST AT STRATFORD

THANKS TO A BARK COLL SCORED ON
A FOUL AND PROTESTED AGAINST

RANGERS LED 2-0 AT HALF
TIME.

An occurrence which robbed the Rangers of the game, and probably the championship, marked the Stratford-Ranger football match at Stratford on the holiday. The Rangers had a comparatively easy time of it in the first half, scoring two tries. Stratford, in the second period, however, they eased up and weakened their attack by changing around the forward line to accommodate Holmes, who said his right leg was bothering him. He was practically useless in this half, and the fine combination displayed by the Berlin boys in the first half, was lost owing to the disorganization, caused by the change. This, however, is not what lost the game. Stratford's first goal, was a beauty, a clean, high shot from the outside right, which was out of Brown's reach. Then a few minutes later came the raw deal. The ball was centred by the left half-back and would have been harmless, but Morgan who kicked the ball hit it with his hand, and kicked it through the goal. Referee McLachlin failed to call the foul, claiming that he had not seen it. Then there was a long dispute. The Rangers demanded of the referee, that he take evidence to prove the Rangers' claim that a foul had been made, but he refused to do so, saying that as he had not seen a foul, it could not be given. Notice of protest was then given. The referee did not even consult the goal umpire, who was a Stratford man at that. Captain Burnham and his men wanted to quit the field, owing to this injustice, but Manager Reiner instructed them to go ahead and finish the game but the enthusiasm and fight was all out of them then, and before the finish, Stratford tallied another goal, a very easy one which found its way through the hurried players just in front of goal. The Rangers base their protest on the following:

1. Morgan, who scored, the disputed goal, just before kicking the ball, knocked it to the ground with his hand, and the referee failed to call a foul.
2. If the referee did not see the foul, he was at fault in not following the play.
3. The referee refused to accede to the demand made by F. L. Weaver, president of the club, acting for the Rangers, that the referee take evidence to prove the contention that a foul had been made.
4. The referee did not even consult the goal umpire, a Stratford man, and an official he had appointed.
5. Certain members of the Ranger team will take affidavits that they saw the foul made.
6. Stratford spectators came forward at the time and said they saw the foul.
7. Referee McLachlin's assertion that he could not allow a foul he had not seen, is at variance with any other decision he had given in the same game, calling a foul on Weber when the ball struck the latter in the face, causing his nose to bleed. The referee was behind Weber and may have thought there was a foul.

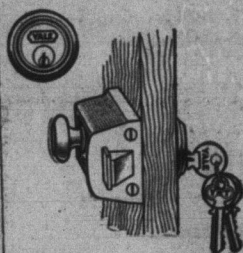
