PARLIAMENTARY PARTY IS STRONG

Irish Elections Show That the
Party Now Possesses Full
Confidence of the People and
Satisfaction is General

HEADS CRACKED OVER "MYLIS THE SLASHER"

LUBLIN, Sept. 15.—The nationalists are greatly pleased over the course of events in connection with the Irish by-elections. Of late there has been a marked disposition on the part of local stalwarts to resign anything in the nature of dictation from the party caucus in the selection of candidates, and since the disaster in Cork the leaders have been careful not to press too openly the claims of their nominees. Hence the fact that in North Sligo and South Kilkenny the local conventions were persuaded to adopt gentlemen approved of by Mr. Redmond and his colleagues, hailed as a blow to faction, and another proof that the Parliamentary party possesses the full confidence of the people. The general satisfaction is all the greater, because in Sligo a contest which would have seriously imperilled the official candidate's chances was averted only at the eleventh hour.

P. J. Flynn, a local Nationalist, came forward in opposition to Mr. Scanlon "as a protest against the trickery by which a majority of the convention was secured." Evidently he commanded a large measure of support, and it is asserted that he would in all probability have been elected his father, Thomas Kelly, Sr., ever, strongly appealed to him to sacrifice his feelings assuring him that if he persisted in infringing the authority of the convention his action would cause widespread injury to the national movement and universal dissatisfaction in Ireland. Mr. Flynn, for the sake of Ireland, accordingly withdrew, although many things had taken place in connection with the vacancy which every right-minded Irishman must deplore. For West Clare something like a dozen candidates are in the field, including Barry O'Brien and Colonel Lynch, formerly member of Galway, and it will be no easy matter to reconcile conflicting claims. An attempt was made to get the priests in the division to act in concert, but after a prolonged conference these gentlemen resolved: "That the priests be perfectly free to do as they think best before and during the election."

At Fines, Westmeath, the other day, serious trouble between rival sections seems to have been averted only by the efforts of a large force of police. Two meetings, one under Sinn Féin auspices, and the other promoted by the League, were held to celebrate the death of Myles O'Reilly, locally known as "Myles the Slasher," who is said to have died fighting on the bridge leading into the village in 1644. Very little, however, appears to have been heard of Myles during the proceedings. Speakers on each side found a more congenial theme in the iniquities of their opponents. The League meeting had hardly begun outside the market house when a wagonette containing the Sinn Féin leaders, and followed by a large crowd of supporters, crossed the bridge and took up a position in close proximity to the "Constitutional" party's platform. This move greatly excited the Leaguers, who formed by far the larger gathering. There was much jostling, and a serious collision seemed imminent, but the police succeeded in separating the rival demonstrators. Thereupon each section tried to howl the other down.

Band after band from the Parliamentarian crowd, each playing a different tune, marched backwards and forwards past the Sinn Féin meeting, and pandemonium reigned. Patrick McKenna, na-

tional director, Southwest Meath, after denouncing in the strongest terms the "knot of factionists" in the wagonette, announced that he would lead the national army over the bridge, accordingly the Leaguers formed a procession, and marched right through the rival gathering. The drumming, rifle-playing, and shouting effectually drowned the Sinn Féin oratory. Feeling ran high, and the police had great difficulty in preventing bloodshed. A number of men wearing green caps attempted to rush the constables, but were repulsed. Ultimately the Sinn Féiners retired from the field amid the triumphant cheers of the other side.

An extraordinary impasse has apparently been reached in the municipal affairs of Gorey. It appears that for two years strained relations have existed between two sections of the town commissioners, the large representation secured by the Labor party at successive elections being keenly resented by the other members of the board. Lately these gentlemen, who number five, have carried their resentment so far as to decline to attend meetings and associate with their four Labor colleagues in the transaction of business. As the statute under which the Commissioners are constituted provides that a quorum of five, the board by a majority has been thoroughly effective. No properly constituted meeting of the commissioners has been held since March, with the result that the public business of Gorey is at a standstill. It is added that at what should have been the usual monthly meeting last week the minority decided to bring the situation to the notice of the local Government Board, and to request that vice-commissioners should be appointed. At the last meeting of the Clogheen Guardians the clerk mentioned that it had been reported that a ghost had visited the female tramp ward on several nights recently. It caused great disturbance to the inmates by tramping loudly up the stairs and approaching some of the beds in a threatening attitude. The apparition took the shape of a woman dressed in white. It suddenly disappeared through a window 22 feet over the ground. The master said he had been called out of bed on two occasions ever since the "ghost" appeared, and that since the appearance there had been a decrease in the number of tramps coming to the house.

The idea that Ireland is without snakes has been thoroughly dispelled. A few days ago a postman named Sinnott, connected with the Beaufort post office, was cycling at Doninga, a couple of miles from the town, he heard a hissing sound in the ditch, and immediately a big reptile wriggled across the road. Sinnott at once jumped off the machine and, pursuing the snake, endeavored to secure it alive, but, failing this, he killed it. The snake measured 27 inches in length and its skin was green, with black spots. The finder had it preserved in methylated spirits, and will endeavor to ascertain the particular species of his find.

The criminal statistics of Ireland for 1908 show that indictable offenses for the whole of Ireland, with the exception of the county of Wick, numbered 9,665 in 1906, declined to 9,418 in the year 1907, but rose last year to 10,265. This represents an increase of 8.5 per cent. as compared with 1906 and of 9.0 per cent. as compared with 1907. The number of persons convicted of offenses for non-indictable offenses was 31,697 more than in the year 1907 and 9,218 above the average for the 10 years 1898-1907. The number of cases of drunkenness in 1908 was less than the number in 1907 by 2,582, and if the figures for drunkenness in 1908 are compared with the average number of such cases in the 10 years 1898-1907 it appears that a decrease amounting to 41,841 had occurred.

The annual report of the registrar-general for Ireland of the marriages, births and deaths registered in Ireland during 1908 shows that the marriages registered numbered 22,734; the births 102,926, and the deaths 78,891. The marriage rate was 5.20 per 1,000 of the estimated population, showing an increase of 0.06 as compared with the year 1907, and an increase of 0.10 as compared with the average for the ten years 1898-1907. The birth-rate was 23.3 per 1,000 of the estimated population, and also 0.1 above the average rate for the ten years 1898-1907; and the death-rate (17.6 per 1,000) was 0.1 below the rate for the preceding year, and 0.2 below the average rate for the ten years 1898-1907.

Pieces rioting has occurred in Thurles (county Tipperary) and the houses belonging to Mrs. Hogan of Stradavogue have been wrecked. Mrs. Hogan has been vigorously boycotted, and several times a wrecking machine was broken and made useless.

At Balla (county Mayo) petty sessions, a district commissioner named Trommsdorff stated that the most serious imprisonment, for having committed a serious assault upon a man named Kelly, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment, because Kelly's cattle or a holding which they both claimed, assaulted him. Thomas Kelly, Sr., was ordered to be imprisoned for three weeks.

EXPECT SITE TO BE ANNOUNCED

Conjectures As to Location of
Experimental Farm Near
Victoria

Word is expected to be received from Ottawa every day of the location of the site for the experimental farm to be established on Vancouver Island. During the visit here of the Hon. Sydney Fisher, minister of agriculture, he stated that the farm would be located in the immediate vicinity of Victoria, and subsequent information showed that it would be within easy reach of a car line. Numerous conjectures have been made as to the site of the farm and the best informed of these, place it either at Skinner's Bottom, Esquimalt, or upon an acreage contiguous to the Cedar Hill road. In either place there is said to be a large tract of land, and either location within easy reach of the city.

The establishment of the farm should give an impetus to the agricultural industry on the island, and it is not unlike an agricultural college.

LET CONTRACT FOR MILL BAY ROAD

Completion of Practicable
Route Gives Settlers Feasible
Route Into Victoria

The contract for the middle or mountain section of the Mill Bay road has been awarded to M. J. Carlin by the provincial government. The cost will be \$130,000 for the ten miles of road necessary to link up the six miles and two mile sections, work upon which has been underway for the past eight months. By the terms of the contract the road is to be completed by January next, and for the first time the upper portion of the island will be reached by a railway, and a feasible and practicable trunk road.

At the present time traffic by way of the summit for wagons with loads of any weight is impossible, owing to the impassable grades. With the completion of the Mill Bay road the farmers of the Shawanigan, Cowichan and other mid-island districts will have a route practicable and easy for traffic, and what is probably the chief difficulty of an All-Vancouver Island trunk road will have been negotiated.

Mr. Carlin will commence operations within a few weeks. Some big rock cuts are rendered necessary to make a practicable route for the purpose for which it is designed, to give the farmer a chance to market his produce without having to go to the expense of buying a railway freight.

The road should be extremely fine, especially in addition to its value, to the settler.

KNIGHT FOUND DEAD

Sir Ralph Denham Moore Supposed to

LONDON, Sept. 14.—Sir Ralph Denham Moore, 10, Moorpark, London, was found dead in bed today. It was learned that his death was due to poison, and it is believed that he took his own life.

Sir Ralph Moore, K. C. M. G., was born in 1860. He was a district inspector in the Royal Irish Constabulary from 1881 to 1891, and was later high commissioner for the Southern district, and in 1898 he married Adrienne, widow of J. Burns, Esq.

CANCER CAUSES

Professor Ford Robertson Gives Results of Long Series of Experiments

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Professor Ford Robertson, after a series of experiments on mice, claims to have raised in the affirmative, the long-debated question as to whether cancer is contagious. He states that he has found that cancer is caused by a parasite or germ, and that it can be transmitted from one animal to another by the use of unsuitable methods employed. The bacteria, if such there be, he argued, may have to be introduced in large numbers, owing to their vulnerability to the minimizing agents of the animal, invaded, or they may have to be introduced during a particular phase of their existence.

Two observations of wide general application are made with regard to the Robertson experiments—first, they seem to prove the special vulnerability of the stomach to cancer, and secondly, that cancer is an infectious disease. Direct injection into the blood was negative. The inference is that anything which breaks down the stomach's defense or functions may lead to cancer. In the second place, these, in conjunction with the experiments of the late Dr. Robert Liston, raise once more the vital question as to whether the so-called germs of cancer, coffee, tea, and condiments, and an excessive quantity of vinegar or salt, and effervescents, and medical salts taken as laxatives.
