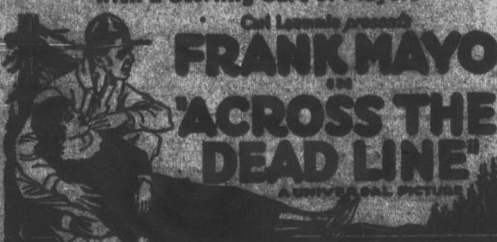

WELL RECEIVED AT THE CAPITAL

Members of Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association Have Good Time.

Ottawa, June 20.—There are gathered here for the convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association, more than five hundred editors and their wives, representing every province in the Dominion. There were many old friends here, those who had the pleasure of participating in the trip of Vancouver, B. C. last year.

On our way up from Edmonton to Ottawa in our special car, we crossed the Quebec bridge into Quebec City, where we had two hours to view this historic spot. Upon arriving in Montreal we had also two hours. On our way down Montreal in the car, we spent the afternoon at the Hotel de Ville, where the observation car was placed at our disposal, and we all enjoyed the view very much.

At Ottawa the Ottawa-Laurier was our headquarters. The meetings were held in the ball room and opened at 10 o'clock with the Mayor of Ottawa, Premier King, Ex-Premier Meighan and Mr. Greer, addressed the gathering. We can do no better than clip the report from the Ottawa papers which was as follows:

Three national leaders, Mr. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Premier of Canada; Mr. Hon. Arthur Meighan, Ex-Premier and leader of the Conservative party; and Hon. T. A. Corcoran, chief of the Progressive group in the House of Commons, for once saw eye to eye, when they joined this festive gathering, a whole-hearted welcome to the delegates to the third annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association, held here by meeting at the Chateau Laurier.

In welcoming the delegates to the Capital of the Dominion, each speaker, in turn, spoke of the great power and influence of the press in politics, social evolution, community life and in all spheres of human activity.

Responsibility of Press.

That the press held in its hands much of the destiny of the state and that the press was responsible for the press of Canada must realize more and more the great responsibility that was theirs, was the opinion of the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie King.

In the opinion of Mr. Premier King, the press was a power to be reckoned with, and that the press was so much indebted to the press of the country, particularly the weekly press, Mr. Corcoran referred to the connection with the weekly press early in life and spoke of the great opportunity that was given to the weekly newspapers in the moulding of a steady, sound public opinion.

The Mayor's Welcome.

Mayor Frank Plant welcomed the delegates to the City of Ottawa in an engaging speech. In extending the freedom of the City to the distinguished gathering, the Mayor stated that he felt at home in their midst. He had started out in life working for a couple of years in the composing room of a western Ontario newspaper, and had also spent two years in the business office of an Ottawa newspaper.

Mr. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King said it was a pleasure to greet such a splendid representation of Canadian journalists, which was doing so much for the good of the country. They represented the weekly press of the more distant parts of Canada as well as the local and urban centers.

NEW BRANCHES OF CATHOLIC W. L.

Bathurst and Chatham Women Inaugurate Women's League in Restigouche.

Bathurst, June 15.—On Sunday last the diocese organizers of the Catholic Women's League, Mrs. J. P. Byrne, Mrs. Donald Fraser and Mrs. H. A. Maloney, accompanied by Mrs. R. C. Molloy, Mrs. W. Cassidy, of Chatham, and the Misses Agatha Melanson and L. Theriault, motored to Dalhousie, where at a well attended meeting of the Catholic women, the aims and objects of the Catholic Women's League were explained fully both in English and in French.

The women of Dalhousie by unanimous vote decided to join their Catholic sisters and a very promising subscription was accordingly organized. The officers elected were: President, Mrs. A. J. Lefebvre; second vice, Mrs. Andrew Allain; third vice, Mrs. George Winchester; secretary, Miss Nettie Blanchard; treasurer, Mrs. James Argenteau.

After the organization the visitors were entertained at dinner by the pastor, Rev. Father Hart. A delightful hour was spent, after which the party proceeded to Campbellton where, despite the unfavorable weather, a large and enthusiastic gathering of women awaited the visiting organizers. Addresses were given by the residents, Mrs. Byrne, Mrs. Fraser, Mrs. Melanson and Miss Theriault, and another large sub-division was formed which promises to become a very active and energetic branch.

The women of Campbellton entered at ten and the party returned to Bathurst in the evening delighted with their reception in both towns and feeling assured that the Catholic welfare work on which expatriation every year in a manner creditable alike to the women themselves and to the Catholic Women's League at large.

CHIEF GAME WARDEN BUSY

Prosecutes Six Game Law Violation Cases and Two Offenders Under Forest Fire Act.

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon recently prosecuted in six game law violation cases in Restigouche and Gloucester Counties and has secured convictions in all cases.

Judge Matheson here gave judgment in five of these cases and fines aggregating to \$135.00 were imposed. The charges in these cases were: deer killing, beaver killing, the slaying of calf moose, acting as guide without license and guiding unlicensed non-resident sportsmen.

RAILWAY OFFERS TO UNDERTAKE SUBWAY

Representative of C. N. R. Here And Makes Proposition—But Terms Not Attractive.

As a fruition from the combined efforts of the Board of Trade and Town Council in the matter of inducing the railway to undertake the proposed Central Street subway, word was received here a short time ago that a representative of the Canadian National Railway would visit Campbellton in the near future and interview the members of the town council on the matter of the subway project.

Tuesday the town council was notified that Mr. S. J. Hungerford, 2nd Vice-President of the railway would arrive on Monday night's local and meet the members of the council. On his arrival here he was met at the depot by His Worship Mayor McKay and the members of the town council, also by a delegation from the Board of Trade. He was driven down to Andrew and Cedar streets and looked over the situation. On returning to his private car the matter of the Central street subway was discussed. Mr. Hungerford promised to put in a subway at Central street, providing the town closed up Andrew and Cedar streets, paying all damages that would arise therefrom, the town also to furnish the land for the approaches to the subway. In discussing the matter Mr. Hungerford said the subway could not be put in this year. He felt however the work could be taken on next year.

The matter of railway gates on the various crossings was also taken up with him. Railway gates he contended were not very satisfactory, and he held out little hope for having them placed upon the crossings.

Mr. Hungerford left on Tuesday night's Limited for Montreal.

NEW BRIDGE AT PATHURST

Erection of Viaduct Over Bathurst Railway Likely to Begin Soon.

Bathurst, June 15.—Word was received on Monday by Town Clerk Street from General Manager Kingsland of the C. N. R. that it had been decided to recommend the building of the proposed concrete and steel overhead bridge where the spur line of the railway intersects Murray street. Word was also sent at that same time to Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, so it is expected that work will soon be started on the structure that the Town Council of Bathurst has been fighting for for the last three years.

ESCAPES FROM DORCHESTER

Convict Escaped Through Pigery Early Sunday Morning And is Still at Large.

Sackville, June 20.—Sunday morning shortly after 10 o'clock Town Marshal Etanbrook, received word from the Dorchester Penitentiary that a convict had escaped and to be on the lookout for him. The man got through the pigery it is said. The guards were turned out promptly and in a short time all the roads were being watched and autos were being held up at railway crossings. Yesterday morning a mounted guard was in Sackville for a short time. The missing man's name is said to be McLean; he came from the neighborhood of Pictou.

A telephone message from Dorchester this morning says the convict is still at large. There is a report that he got away in an automobile, but this has not been confirmed.
