Carnival Notes from Rome ROME, Feb. 28.—At the corsa dei barberi of Tuesday night, the last of the carnival, through blundering management of the municipal authorities the horses were let loose before the corso was cleared of people. Twelve men and women were trampled under the horses hoofs, and two are already dead. The confusion was findeful and the dead. The confusion was frightful, and the queen, who was watching the corsa from the Palazzo Fiano, almost fainted at the spectacle. After the injured had been removed, King Humbert immediately visited them at the hospital of San Giacomo al

spectacle. After the injured had been removed, King Humbert immediately visited them at the hospital of San Giacomo al Corso. He is reported to have said very emphatically that he would stop the cruel business for the future. The maddened horses had found a human barricade, against which they dashed themselves and fell.

The local press is complaining bitterly of the minister of war for refusing the services of the soldiers who have been accustomed to line the street on both sides from the Pizzzo del Peoplo to the Piazza Venezia, where the horses are stopped. When the bope's government supervised the sport this precaution was invariably taken for the protection of spectators. Furthermore, a squad of dragoons used to start from the Pizzi Venezia at full speed and clear the whole corse, which was kept clear afterwards by a double row of soldiers until the horses had reached the end of the course.

of its Affairs. CHARLOTTETOWN, March 14,-At the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of Prince Edward Island held here the directors' report was presented. It stated that they have used every effort to realize and secure the bank assets, with result that \$87,000 has been paid in on account for any reason the work cannot be done on that \$\$7,000 has been paid in on account to be done on bills receivable, \$168,000 on overdrawn accounts, and \$6000 on mortgages and judg ments, making a total of \$261,000; also that securities on real estate, shipping, stooks, etc., have been taken to secure in whole or in part \$300,000 more.
