Miss Mollie Welles is stamping Henry County, Iowa, as republican nominee for recorder.

All the English counties except Cornwall, Cumberland, and Lancashire have less live stock than they had thirteen years ago.

A peculiarity of the Wilmington, Wrightsville, and Ouselet Coast Railway Company in North Carolina is that it is owned by colored men, and will be operated exclusively by them. J. B. Martin, an enterprising colored man of Wilmington, is the manager.

The ticket-of-leave system is to be introduced at Michigan state reform school for girls at Adrian. Girls who have made good records will hereafter be released on parole without the usual expenses.

A portion of their wages will be placed to their credit, and if they behave well they will be discharged.

At a Buddhist meeting held lately in Japan, one of the speakers said: "Of late the progress made by Christianity has been marvellous, and may be compared to a fire sweeping over a plain, which constantly increases in power." Another Christian speaker is in such demand in India that in Lucknow and Owarepore there are said to be no less than forty-five publishing houses doing the work.

The Japanese Military Gazette estimates the total land forces of the empire at 100,383, composed as follows: Generals, 30; officers, 2629; non-commissioned officers, 6991; privates, 90,746; artificers, 40; cadets, 725; cadets abroad, 17; control detachments, 1768. The regular force, however, only number, it appears, 43,705, while the militia and reserves total to 58,415. The number of horses is 3112.

The doctrine is held by a few Polish Jews that a good man may sell his soul upon heaven. This belief is based on the rabbinical proverb, "Be good deeds by the future world," which is interpreted by most Jews to mean that by doing good one may secure for himself happy immortality. H. H. Cohen's heavenly claim for \$150,000, Cohen backed out of the agreement, and the result was a fraud which sent U. S. to jail.

Some time after the Franco-Prussian war, Dettelle painted a battle piece in which a few Prussian prisoners figured rather conspicuously. He showed it to Marshal MacMahon, who after twisting his moustache, said in a stern and commanding tone, "I am a man of war, and I have seen many battle pieces about a dozen prisoners during the war, but where they were beaten nine evening nights with broomsticks. Gambetta, the ex-dictator of France, has a niece who is a very promising pianist. A discovery is reported in the Agricultural Gazette of Vienna which opens up a new career to the potato. It seems that the humble tuber can be transformed into a material for the manufacture of mechanical pieces of the very choicest quality by the simple operation of boiling it for thirty-six hours in a certain chemical solution, and squeezing it afterward in a press till whatever moisture it may contain has been extracted. The residuum is then declared to be "a hard block of a delicate creamy white hue, in every respect as suitable to the manufacture of ornamental and artistically executed pipe heads as the finest clay."

The potato thus treated is also found to be an excellent substitute for ivory in the manufacture of such articles as brush and umbrella handles, fans and caskets.

Miller was tried by a Wisconsin baptist church, of which he is a pillar, on a charge of irregular conduct in going to a negro minstrel show. His defense was that he started for a temperance lecture, got into the wrong hall, and did not discover his mistake until the show began. In Germany in 1881 a census was made of the condition of trades. From an abstract published recently of the results of this statistical inquiry, it appears that women are taking a more and more active part in trades and industries. Most of the female working people are engaged in the textile branches, in actual trades and in leather and paper manufactures. The age of those females is between 12 and 27 years. In all 348,755 female laborers, and in the 93,854 German manufacturers, who also give employment to 1,639,099 men. There is no manufacturing in which female workers are not engaged.
