He has gnace oo India, as tho first Forcign Mivsionary, decignated and supported ly the Preabyterian Cburch of Cannda. The precine Locality of the Mission is yot undeterpined. The Committee on Fureign Missions, appointed by the Synod, hupe to obtain the services of a young Cuuadina dinister as associate with Mr. Stevensun in this holy cuterprise.
Mission of tiee United Bnatanen to tur Mfongois.-The Church of the United Arethren, with that faith nad self denial which has caused them in so mnny cases to choose positions of the utmngt hardahip and difficulty, have lately established a mis-ion station in the Himalnyn, at a height of 10,000 feet nbove the sen, and amung tribes little known. Tro of their number, during last year, made a long tour through the high lands of Thibet, in ordes to discover the best position to be occupied as a basis of operatiors. They have selected Keting, near Kardang. upon the River Jhagar.

Femais Enuontion in India.-I.etters from Dr. Duff repart the progress of fomale educatinn in India beyond any former period. In the presidencies of Mradias and Bombay the missinnaries fiud that now the work could be doubled in extent if the funds wero supplied ; and they are begioning to fiad that it is one of the most urgent and must important points in the great mission scheme. The tide now is turned in referonce to female education in Cnleutta.
Effect of Socradism. -The extensive cotton milla at New Lanark were for a long time under the management of Robert Owen, the quindam infidel, but, whose incredulity (must credulous 1) has, it is said, been fixed on spirit Lapping and other whimsical emptiness. This. extraordinary man, who must now be more than eighty years of age, here plied his system of damaging truth and marshalling every seductive error ; and, though his professed followers are not many, even in this disirict, I was informed that two marked fentures of the peoplo bave been continued, perhapg as a waraing to those who deify gedle-s plant, The large number of illegitimate births, and the excessive iicense of the tongue in elandering a neighbour, are the only prominent results of the years devoted to "the people" by the man who denied a God. The present preprictors of the mills do much to reniedy these sad effects of infidel teaching. All the children are sent to school, both before they are of an age to rork and during their employment. The young men have a library aud clreses for improvement, and a hardworking minister watches with anxiety and labours with zeat for their. eternal welfare,-English Paper. $\times$
