THE LATE JUDGE G E. RIOUX.

Our members will learn with regret of the death of judgeG E. Rioux, which took place at Sherbrooke, Que., on the 21st February last. He succumbed to a disease which had been undermining him for sometime.

Judgo Rioux descended from an old French family located in this country since 1686 and to which the seigniory of Three Rivers had been granted by the King of France. The deceased was born on the 18th March, 1840, and
