Ottawa, Dec. 21.-The governor-general has intimated his intention of attending in person the funeral of the late premier at Halifax, on January 3rd. Lady Aberdeen will also go to Halifax to be near Lady Thompson during the trying ordeal. The governor-general will be the guest of Lieutenant-Governor Conservative club held recently to aid in referring to this unhappy chapter Daly. The official train from tCtawa will go via Point Levis.

A requiem mass was sang in the Roman Catholic cathedral this morning for the repose of the soul of the late Sir John Thompson. It was a state affair the expense being borne by the govern-ment. The decorations done under the direction of the department of public works cost over a thousand dollars and were very fine. The catafalque, which had the latters "S. J." worked in gold, was a most artistic affair. The mass was celebrated by the achbishop, assisted by several priests.
