

WET SALTED FISH AND FISH IN BRINE:

03.05.62.00.0 Cod (Gadus morhua; G. ogac; G. macrocephalus):
subject to 10.6% duty

03.05.69.10.0 Boreogadus saida: subject to 6% duty.

03.05.69.90.1 Gadus callarias: subject to 10.2% duty.

03.05.69.90.9 Other species of cod: subject to 6% duty.

The quotas set for 1987 were as follows:

Fresh or chilled cod: 5000 tonnes (2100 tonnes in the first quarter, 1400 tonnes in the second quarter, 700 tonnes in the third quarter, and 800 tonnes in the fourth quarter).

Fresh or chilled cod fillets: 2 000 tonnes (500 tonnes per quarter).

Wet salted cod (bacalao verde): 12 790 tonnes (5 755 tonnes in the first quarter, 1 900 tonnes in the second quarter, 1 900 tonnes in the third quarter, and 3 235 tonnes in the fourth quarter).

For species with quotas greater than 100 tonnes per quarter, import permits granted by the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Finance were limited to 5% of the annual quota.

A bond equivalent to 5% of the peseta value of the transaction must be submitted together with the import permit. This bond is forfeited if the respective importation is not carried out within 90 days following issuance of the import permit.

Under the Department of External Trade Resolution of 15 January 1988 (published in the Boletín Oficial of 19 January 1988), the quotas for 1988 are as follows:

Fresh or chilled cod: 5500 tonnes (2310 tonnes in the first quarter, 1540 tonnes in the second quarter, 770 tonnes in the third quarter, and 880 tonnes in the fourth quarter).

Wet salted cod: 15 000 tonnes (6 750 tonnes in the first quarter, 2 230 tonnes in the second quarter, 2230 tonnes in the third quarter, and 3 790 tonnes in the fourth quarter).

Fresh or chilled cod fillets: 2200 tonnes (550 tonnes per quarter).
