Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): In so far as the Department of Energy, Mines and Resources is concerned: 1. No, other than the eastward extension of the proposed Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline and the looping of the existing system of Trans-Canada PipeLines Limited.
