Henry Clews Talks Big in Regard to America's Financial Ability Just Now.

Henry Clews, in his weekly letter, says: The United States will continue to make war munitions on a vast scale, Europe cannot pay for them in mer-clandise. It is not desirable that the great banks of Europe should weaken reserves by payment in gold, which we do not want. Big credits can unquestionably be placed here, but even that method only defers settlement. Ultimately Great Britain and other countries in a lesser degree must liquidate a portion at least of their American investments. This market will not accept British, German, French Russian loans to any great extent We are quite able, however, and quite willing to take back our own securitles in considerable sums. Capital awaiting investment is plentiful in this country, our pepole are economizing and we have reason for ample con-fidence in our own financial and industrial future. In these respects, we were never stronger. Thus far British holders have obstinately refused to let go of their American holdings. It remains to be seen how long they will be able to continue this policy. The stock market is in an unsettled condition and is pulled in different directions; first by cheap money. which makes many good shares seem very desirable and is stimulating; second, by the ex-traordinary excess of imports, which encourages foreign selling of Ameri-

cans and is weakening, and, third, by the delicacy of our relations with Ger-many, which may send the market up or down, according to developments.

berta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Agency out not sub-agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
