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BULGARS CLOSE TO NISH, BUT SERB ARMY REMAINS UNBROKEN
Russians Defeat a Large German Force in a Forest Near Czartorysk
GREEK CABINET CRISIS EXPECTED TO BRING ON ELECTION

FRESH SUCCESS WON FOR CZAR NEAR PODGACIE

Large Force of Germans Cut Off in Forest and Destroyed. WIN IN LAKE REGION Many Teuton Attacks Repulsed and Advance Continued.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 4.—Eight officers and about 400 Austro-German soldiers were taken prisoner by the Russians in the repulse of an attack west of Czartorysk, where the Germans had succeeded in penetrating deeply into the forest and were commencing to extend their ranks.

The Russians also won another success south of Lake Swarzewo, 300 miles west of Dvinsk, where they defeated many counter-attacks, took five officers and 521 men prisoners and captured four machine guns.

A German offensive was repulsed in the region of Shlok, west of Riga. A German attempt to cross the Dvina near Glandan below Dvinsk was defeated. The Russians have advanced southeast to the outskirts of Ilbuck, in the Dvinsk sector, which the enemy captured a week ago.

GREAT CANADIAN WILL BE HONORED IN DEATH
State Funeral Will Be Held for Sir Charles Tupper at Halifax.

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—It has been officially decided that a state funeral will be held for the late Sir Charles Tupper. It will take place at Halifax after the body has lain in state there. The date will probably be Tuesday, Nov. 16, the remains arriving at Quebec on the Metagama on the 13th, and being taken by rail to Halifax.

MACKENSEN'S ARMY SMALL BUT SHELL SUPPLY IS HUGE
Artillery Described as Ample for Army of a Million—Fighting Around Uskup Was Bitterest of War.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Daily Chronicle's Serbian correspondent, who has just reached Saloniki from Belgrade and Kraguevatz, declares that the German progress in Serbia is a repetition of the old story of overwhelming artillery power. "It is established," he says, "that Von Mackensen's army does not include more than 150,000 men, but is provided with artillery ample for an army of a million. Into Belgrade alone more than 50,000 shells were poured."

BRITISH STEAMER ON FIRE HALIFAX RECEIVES WIRELESS

HALIFAX, N. S. Nov. 4.—A wireless message was received here tonight from the British steamer Rio Lagos, saying that she was on fire, and asking for help. She left New York for Queenstown Oct. 21.

BRITISH SUCCESSES IN KAMERUN

LONDON, Nov. 4.—An official communication issued tonight concerning the operations in the Kamerun region of German Southwest Africa says the Towns of Bamenda and Banyo have been occupied by the British, whose casualties were small.

RUSSIANS MOVE ON CZERNOWITZ
Czar's Armies Also Take Offensive at Three Other Points.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—Having checked the German offensive along the whole eastern front, except directly west of Riga, where the nature of the ground makes an advance difficult, the Russians have started a counter-offensive at three points—west of Dvinsk, on the Stripa in Volhynia and on the Stripa in Galicia. On the Stripa River they won a big victory and captured 5000 prisoners, also admitting that the battle is still in progress.

MANY OFFERS OF BATTALIONS

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—Reports are still coming in of new battalions of units offered for overseas service. Donald Sutherland, M.P., offers to raise a battalion in Oxford County. H. B. Morphy, M. P., says that a full battalion can be raised in Perth County and Stratford.

WILSON BEGINS CAMPAIGN FOR GREATER ARMY

U. S. President Plans Training of Big Force for Defence. NAVY TO BE BUILT UP Enlarged Building Program Also Within Plans of Chief Magistrate.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—President Wilson opened the administration campaign for his national defence program in a comprehensive and carefully prepared address, delivered here tonight at the Manhattan Club banquet.

CHICAGO PACKERS HIT BY NEW RESTRICTIONS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Counsel for Chicago packers called at the state department today with a complaint that Great Britain had imposed new and more rigid restrictions upon their trade with neutral European countries.

SHIP ATTACKED BY SEAPLANES

LONDON, Nov. 5, 12.56 a.m.—Germany appears to be trying a new method of attack on British merchantmen—with seaplanes. The Cork steamer Avoca, which has arrived at Manchester, tells a story, according to The Liverpool Journal of Commerce, of a 35 minutes' engagement with three hostile seaplanes at 11 o'clock on the morning of Oct. 30.

OTTAWA WILL INVEST HALF A MILLION IN LOAN

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—Following the lead of the Duke of Connaught, who is to be the first subscriber to the new Canadian war loan, the mayor and board of control decided this afternoon that \$500,000 of the city's sinking fund should be invested in the loan.

SERBS FALLING BACK IN ORDER FORCES INTACT

Enemy Continues Advance, But is Unable to Smash Little Opponent. TEN MILES FROM NISH Bulgars Are Also Moving Northwest From Uskup Towards Pristina.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Serbians who are making a stand in the south, where they are supported by the British and French, continue their retreat before the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians in the north and northeast. The Bulgars are now within ten miles westward from Uskup towards Pristina.

ITALY IN NO ATTEMPT TO DISCUSS PEACE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—At the Italian Embassy today, this statement was issued: "The Italian Embassy has been instructed to deny most emphatically that any kind of attempts have been made by the Italian government to discuss peace."

SERB POSITION NOT HOPELESS

LONDON, Nov. 4.—An artillery duel was in progress virtually all day today in Valandovo, in the Strumitza region. Between the French and the Bulgarians, a Reuter despatch from Saloniki states.

CLEMENCEAU GIVEN IMPORTANT OFFICE

PARIS, Nov. 4.—Ex-Premier Georges Clemenceau has been elected president of the senate committee on the army, in place of Charles de Freycinet, who is vice-president of the Grand cabinet.

BIG EFFORTS MADE TO RESIST ITALIANS

Poles and Hungarians Taken From Russian Front Among Prisoners. UDINE, Italy, via Paris, Nov. 4.—Austrian prisoners who are still passing thru Udine from the scene of the late conflicts, testify to the special efforts made by their army to repulse the long-expected Italian offensive.

BERLIN SAYS WHITLOCK LEFT OF OWN ACCORD

German Government Stated to Have Made No Complaint. BERLIN, Nov. 4.—via wireless to Saville.—Among the items given out for publication by the Overseas News Agency today was the following: "The reports that the German government asked the withdrawal of the American minister at Brussels and Whitlock, are absolutely untrue."

FIGHTING HEAVY IN CHAMPAGNE

PARIS, Nov. 4.—In the course of heavy fighting in the Champagne, the French forces in the vicinity of the Chausson farm, between Heilly 199 and Maisons de Champagne, drove the Germans completely out of the last sections of their advanced trenches which the Teutons occupied yesterday.

TEUTON POSITIONS IN BELGIUM SUBJECTED TO HEAVY BOMBARDMENT

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SIR WILFRID GREENFELL WILL JOIN RED CROSS

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Nov. 4.—Sir Wilfrid T. Greenfell, the "Pastor of Labrador" who is here attending the medical missionary conference, announced today that he would leave in company with the Harvard unit of Red Cross workers for active service in France. Dr. Greenfell will spend his missionary furlough working in some French or British hospital. He spoke here today on his work in Labrador to a large audience of 4,500 workers from all over the world.

NO GENERAL ELECTION TILL WAR'S CONCLUSION

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Marquis of Lansdowne, minister without portfolio, announced in the house of lords today that the government was firmly of the opinion that there should be no general election until after the war.

ZAIMIS' DEFEAT WILL PROBABLY CAUSE ELECTION

Indications Point to Early Dissolution of the Greek Parliament. ONUS PLACED ON KING London Hopes for Recall of Venizelos, But is Not Over Sanguine.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The defeat of the Greek Government in the chamber of deputies and the consequent resignation of the Zaimis cabinet is the latest sensation afforded by the Balkans. While, of course, it was understood that Eleutherios Venizelos, the former premier, had it in his power to turn the government out whenever he so desired, having the majority in the chamber at his back, the fall of Zaimis came unexpectedly, as it was believed that the leader of the majority had decided to accord the premier sufficient support to enable him to remain in office for the present at least.
