New facts relating to Eozoon Canadense. By J. W. Dawson, of Montreal, Canada.

At the last meeting of this Association, I had the pleasure of exhibiting some specimens of Eozoon Canadense, and of giving some oral explanations as to its nature and mode of occurrence. I now ask permission to mention a few additional facts which have been made known since the meeting at Detroit, and which still further contribute to our knowledge of the most ancient known fossil.

(1.) I would first beg leave to direct attention to the very interesting series of specimens now on exhibition in Philadelphia, in the collection of the Canadian Geological Survey; and which give a rare opportunity to study the various aspects of the fossil. In connection with Eozoon, I would also mention the remarkable mass of Graphite from Buckingham on the Ottawa, exhibited by the Dominion Plumbago Company of Canada. This mass is from one of the great beds of that mineral occurring in the Lower Laurentian, on a horizon not remote from that of Eozoon, and which in my judgment are really Laurentian coals, representing the vegetation (231)
