

# ON A HUNDRED CLAIMS WORK NOW BEING DONE

Appearance of Spring Brings Cheer

in the Camp.

PORCUPINE CITY, Mar. 28.—(From Our Man Up North.)—Bears' appearance along the trails, the whistle of the meat bird, and the ominous caw of the crow tell full well the whole story of fast approaching spring while nature is getting ready to robe in the newest and neatest spring fashions. It may be a few weeks and yet it may not be so long, but the inevitable is coming just the same when the motor boat will take the place of the sleigh and the puff of exploded gasoline be supplanted for the puff of the sturdy horse.

And in the meantime those who have prepared for work on claims are rejoicing that the ring of the hammers and the "chill" of the drills will be in evidence on more than a hundred claims in the immediate vicinity. This last week work started on the Hughes claims to the north of Porcupine City where sensational finds were made last January, operations on the Smith veteran have been redoubled while at the Gold Reef consistent, methodical surface uncovering has been going on for two weeks. Here a handsome vein in the quartz carrying free gold has been uncovered.

Around Pearl Lake work has taken a more active turn and a half dozen companies are uncovering, stripping, shooting up the rocks, as just a little reminder of what will happen when spring is a few more weeks advanced. All thru the northern half of DeLoro companies as well as prospectors are working out daily to get in trim for the more arduous duties that will come later, and with work now starting in nearly every portion of the camp, who can say after a week's review of the camp what will turn up before the end of summer?

Why call wildcat when work is just about starting in a belt so well mineralized that men are willing to risk thousands and thousands?

## LUTHERAN COLONY COMING

Families From Baltic Provinces Will  
Settle in Timiskaming.

Rev. W. C. Miller, pastor of the new Evangelical Lutheran Church at College and Markham-streets, and Fred Dane, land commissioner of the T. & N. O. Railway, are up in Timiskaming making a preliminary survey with a view to the settlement of two townships in Timiskaming by newcomers from the Baltic Provinces of Germany and from Scandinavia.

He turned to the Timiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway Commission for information, and with their assistance has created a great interest in Northern Ontario in sections of Norway, Sweden and Baltic Germany.

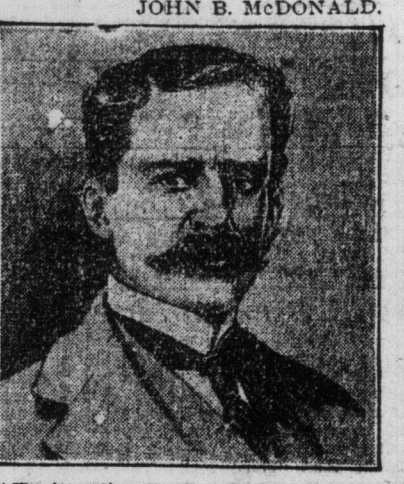
