WHEAT PRICES DECLINE DESPITE CROP DAMAGE

The Heavy World's Shipments Anticipated and Increase in Visible Supply More Than Offset News of Field Injuries.

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.-Threshing delays this side of the Canadian border and crop damage across that line proved insufficient today to offset in the wheat market the bearish effect of expected heavy world shipments and an increase in the United States visible supply. Closing prices were easy, 1-8c to 5-8c under last night. The outcome in corn varied from 1-2c decline to 1-4c advance. Oats finished 1-8c to 1-4c off to 3-4c up, and provisions less cestly by a shade to 15c to 17 1-2c.

Cold, wet weather in the northwest brought about a mid-session rally in the wheat market, but at other times
