NEWSPRINT SITUATION MARKEDLY IMPROVES

Washington, July 22.-Marked im provement in newsprint paper conditions, but little change in the consumption of book paper, were reported today by the federal trade commission. The attention of newspaper publishers again was called to the conservation order by the war indus-tries board, recently made public, which the commission estimates will lower paper consumption at least 5 the percentage of returns and free copies of publications using both newsprint and book paper in June. More rigid economies also were practised, especially by newspaper publishers. Some important daily and Sunday newspapers still show high returns, one of 25 per cent, and an-other 18 per cent. Monthly maga-zines also had excessive returns, being as high as 40 per cent., while two weeklies had 20 per cent. of returns. "The figures indicate that some publishers are not yet curtailing wastes as much as might be done,
